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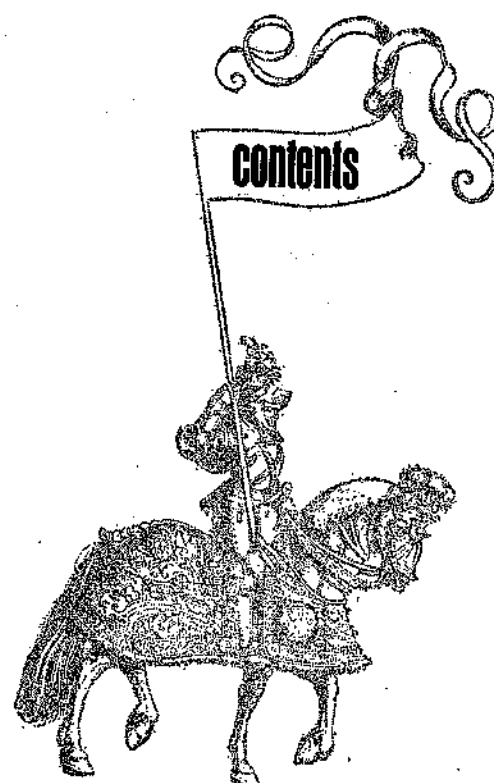

## DISTRICT FUNCTIONS

Members are reminded that there will be four more district functions before the Lions year draws to a close at the end of June:

(a) **Lions Clubs Joint Charity Ball of 1969** will take place on 24th April in the grand ballroom of Hong Kong Hilton. This is the social highlight of the year and over 500 members and their guests are expected to attend.

(b) **1969 District Convention** in which district governor 303 of 1969-70 will be elected has been scheduled on 24th May in the Asia Room of Hong Kong Hilton. There will be about 100 delegates, alternates and observers from the 9 Clubs in the district.

(c) **1969 District Convention Night** will follow the convention and held on the night of 24th May in the grand ballroom of Hong Kong Hilton.

(d) **Lions Leadership Forum, 1969** will take place on 7th June at the Peninsula Hotel. All club office bearers of 1969-70 and new members who join the Lions movement between 1st July, 1968-30th June, 1969 are expected to be present at the Forum. All other Lions are welcome.

## LIONS CLUBS JOINT CHARITY BALL, 1969

### Brief reports:

H.E. the Governor and Lady Trench will attend the Ball and enter the Ballroom at 8.32 p.m. Lion members and their guests are requested to arrive before 8.20 p.m.

Veteran Lion Jack Yuen will be master of ceremonies.

About \$90,000 have already been received and entered into the Ball's account.

There will be 1,000 prizes in the "Lucky Dip" organized by the Lionesses.

## Fund Raising at District Level:

It has been questioned on many occasions by many Lions as to whether it is really worth all the efforts to organize a Charity Ball annually, mobilising over one hundred members. A great many, particularly the mathematically minded, said that it was not and very logically so because in the past whatever was required to be sold in the form of raffle tickets and advertisements was generally absorbed by the individual members. Public sales normally represent only a small percentage of the proceeds. This year each member is expected to be responsible for a minimum of \$300 to \$400 worth of raffle tickets plus \$200 worth of advertisements. If each member is to contribute a total of \$500-, 500 members will have fulfilled the target of \$250,000- thus saving all the frustrations of organizing a ball.

However, I myself hold a different view. To me the Joint Charity Ball is more than a fund raising campaign. It is to me the essence and symbol of many facets of Lionism.

It is a symbol of unity and collaboration of all the 9 Clubs of Hong Kong working in unison striving to attain a common goal, namely, service to the community.

It is the distinction of the Lions Clubs from other fund raising agencies in that we Lions carry out specific projects of our own with our own initiative. A case in point is our Eye Bank, or perhaps others like our Hole-in-Heart Project.

It is also our re-dedication to Lionism so that we shall not forget that ours are service clubs and our main concern is service to the community. It is an example of our proud tradition of co-operation, of how we have to contribute our time and our efforts and not just making donations.

It is a joint function and main social event of the year. A grand ball of glitter and glamour for the merry making of our Lions and friends of all races and nationalities for the promotion of fellowship and international goodwill.

It is an occasion to seek recognition, to spread Lionism, to make friends, to make known to the public of our activities and aspirations, to express our gratitude for the response received and to solicit support for our future projects and appeals.

It is a reminder to the public of our existence and

our constant striving for better service.

Thus the Joint Charity Ball serves a multiple of purposes besides fund raising which cannot be attained merely by members' monetary contribution.

## Fund Raising at Club Level:

Every year funds are raised by individual clubs for projects at club level. In this respect I like to make just one or two observations.

Firstly, the tradition that a Lions Club does not approach other Lions Clubs for donations should be followed.

Secondary, as a friendly gesture and a token of co-operation the other clubs should make it a policy to assist the organizing club by means of participation. If each club can arrange to have at least say 12 persons to take part in the function, the organizing club would be assured of a minimum of about 100 persons or 8 round tables in addition to the participation of its own members enabling a more impressive function on a more elaborate scale to be held. Any club should have no difficulty in having 6 couples attending the functions of other clubs if a little effort is made and this gesture of co-operation can be expected to be reciprocated when it comes to its own turn to organise an official function.

## Fund Raising on the Basis of Individual Members:

Each person when accepting membership in the Lions Clubs must be warned and must be prepared to contribute annually an expected amount of money for community service. He must understand what is expected of him in becoming a member. With this in mind there should be no hesitation or refusal by the individual members when approached for contributions.

It is disheartening to note that some of our members, the very wealthy members, are not giving the same financial assistance to the Lions Club as they do to the other charitable organizations which offer more glamour and perhaps social status. A few of them can find time to attend the functions or even act as directors of these charitable organizations but show very poor attendance records at our own meetings.

In the case of this magazine "The H.K. LION" I like to emphasize once again that it is a publication by the Lions and of the Lions. This is our own

property and it has to depend on advertisements as one of its sources of revenue to defray its cost of printing. The editors have put in a great deal of time and efforts in its publication. Each member is expected to do his part.

The present policy is to solicit one advertisement from one of the members of each club each month so that there would be at least 9 advertisements in each issue to help to defray part of the printing cost. It has also been the policy to avoid approaching the same member more than once. There are certain members who voluntarily offer to put in advertisements month after month. But these members are few.

In my experience in soliciting advertisements for the magazine I have been politely turned down on numerous occasions. On the majority of cases the reason given was that the District and more often his own club was conducting a fund raising campaign

at the time and therefore unable to oblige.

I feel that this is entirely due to the wrong concept of the members not realising the fact that this is their own magazine and their own property. Would any one say that having contributed to the District function or to his own club function, he cannot give his own family the usual allowance in that month? Of course not! Similarly, one should not decline giving financial assistance to the "H.K. LION" on the same basis because the magazine is really his own.

In the last two months solicitation for advertisements has been increasingly difficult and it is even more discouraging when even some of the Club Editors cannot offer any assistance.

Let us face it. If we want to keep this publication of ours in healthy existence, each of us must do our part. The "H.K. LION" must not be left to be the last item to receive financial support.

### 3rd Veep Aspirant Visits Hongkong

Past International Director Georges Friedrichs, accompanied by Julien Garofalo, District Governor of District 103, France and Robert Watteaux, member of the Lions Club D'oesay, Paris, visited Hongkong on Sunday March 23 enroute to Japan for a conference with Japanese Lions. Georges Friedrichs is one of the five candidates for 3rd Vice President of Lions International at International Convention to

be held in Tokyo in July.

District Governor Hilton hosted the visitors to luncheon at the Blue Heaven Restaurant that afternoon whereafter he himself left for Tokyo on a one week's business, and we suspect some of it will be Lions trip.

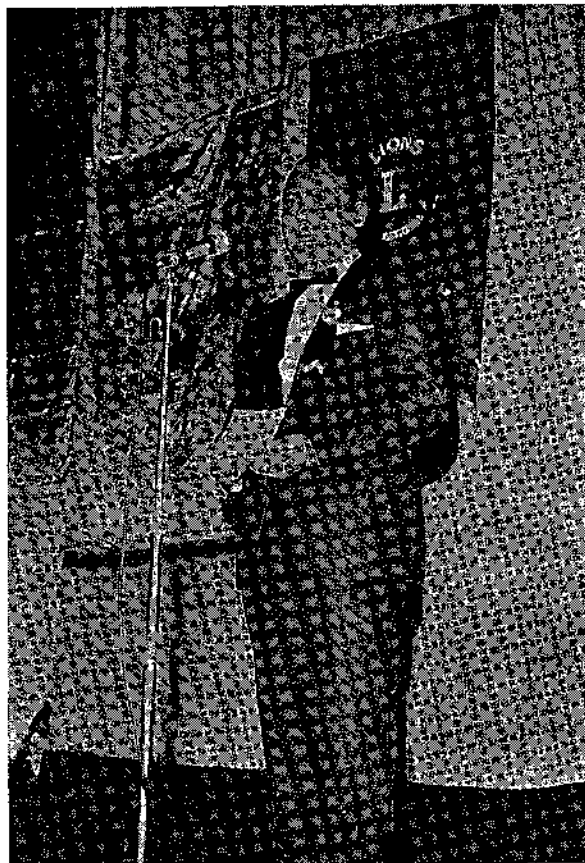

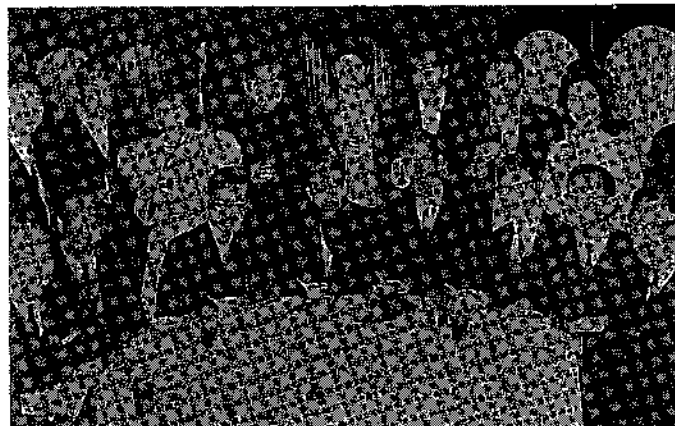

## 交通安全問題

香港交通安全會會長陳普芳議員於二月四日在快活谷獅子會例會席上，就最近在港舉行之國際交通安全會議，作詳細報告與剖析，對如何改進香港日益複雜的交通問題，甚有見地，立論正確。

本人謹略談第一次在遠東舉行的國際交通會議。

一月廿四日至廿七日，香港會舉行一個遠東從未有過的國際性交通安全會議，近三百人參加，包括有十個國家代表，主要的（指多過一人的）是澳洲四人代表團，有三位是國會議員；星洲二人；印尼二人；菲律賓三人；除國外代表，其他大部份都是香港政府與道路安全有關的機構——包括教育司、警察、交通事務處、新界民政署、工務司、華民政務司等機構的高級官員，足證當局對會議的重視，使到會議有超過預期的成功。

所有外地來港的代表團，都非常欣賞這個會議的組織及結果，於是在會議最後一日，召集臨時會議決定籌備第二次東遠會議，並籌辦世界交通安全組織。

最初代表們的意見，都是以香港為中心，但是我考慮清楚，提出我們在香港的困難，後來決定明年一月卅日至二月二日，在星架坡舉行。

我對此事，亦有遺憾，因為假如此國際組織在香港建立，香港在交通安全上，在國際間可能建立崇高的地位。我看到的困難有許多點。

一、香港交通安全會每年選舉明年的會長很難預測是那一位，他對國際的組織有沒有興趣，現時不得而知，有興趣時仍然有許多其他的困難。

財政方面有問題，此國際會議的費用非常低廉，有許多的安排是有熱心人資助的，會議擴大了，財政的行政會發生問題。

三、此次會議有港府大力支持，但全不是財政方面的。贊助人，而是親臨參加和提供意見的。開始舉辦時，布政司支持此一會議，但聲明在人士上不能協助。工務司亦允許支持兼任顧問，會議時他自己及未來工務司亦有列席，並派出高級工程師四十人參加研討會。警察最初是不大贊同此國際會議的，理由是很顯明的，當時對來年的情形未確定清楚，後來我向他們保證不過度虛耗他們的實力，然後才獲得他們支持。在會議進行中，他們對會議的貢獻，受到國際人士贊揚。教育司方面的支持甚為有力，有高級官員二十人參加會議。「交通事務處」，幾乎全體參加。新界民政署亦有十餘高級官員參加。司法部門感到非常大的興趣，法官、皇家律政司及首席裁判司亦參加，發表專論。

此種國際性會議，假如會議的主題不適合及論文不適當，是會失敗的。主題方面有兩個選擇：第一是（LIFE IS A MANY SPLENDOROUS THING, DO NOT LOSE IT ON THE ROADS）；第二是（ROAD SAFETY—EVERY BODY RESPONSIBILITY）。因為後來發覺論文方面，包羅萬有，多姿多采，因此便採用第二個主題。

論文方面，專家十分捧場。在各位面前的論文，第一輯第二輯及後來收到論文列入的第三輯（現時在印刷中），交通安全歷史的最有價值的文獻，不特在香港甚至世界上都有值得研究的地方。

我們的困難，是因為（交通安全）仍然不知其政府那一部門負責，似乎和上述的機關都有關係，但都不是直系責任。因是下屆會議在香港舉行，世界機構在港建立的問題，不與一部門磋商便沒有結果。



香港現時仍然是殖民地，在香港建立國際機構總部，似乎並不適宜。

在這次會議上，有許多寶貴意見，因為分組討論，有許多我是沒有參加的，現時根據我所知的，向各位報導一二：

一、專家認為：香港行人，毫不重視生命，學生方面，為了有交通安全隊協助，可能令到下一代的行人，比較會在道路上遵守規矩。

二、為減少法庭的擠迫，在不久的將來，對違例停車會施行就地處罰。因為統計上，百分之九十五都是認罪的。

三、為增加道路安全，或隱或現的電子式光管招牌，專家們將建議絕禁止。

四、專家們發現：行人喜歡行隧道而不喜歡天橋。

五、專家們認為：非然交通失事常有，但根據統計，在家中的危險更大。

六、專家們發現，大字，海報仍然是教育交通安全最佳最經濟的武器。

七、專家們認為：在一年中駕車失事兩次而傷人的司機，要施行心理檢驗及重新考試。

八、專家們認為：兒童在雨天穿着黃色塑膠雨衣，可減少意外。

九、專家們認為：交通安全在學校裏，要成為必修的科目。

十、專家們對香港的交通安全隊，在其他國家有效法的必要。

（十一）專家們認為：香港交通失事增加，是為了大陸來港的居民，他們根本不知有使用道路的常識，及方法。

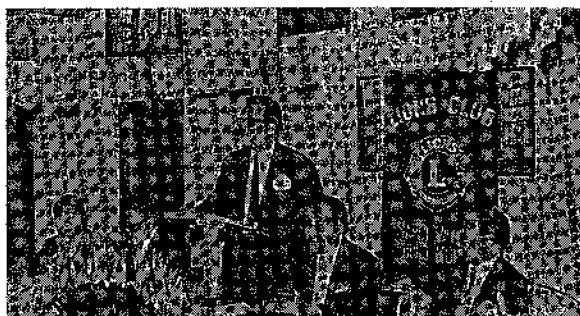
（十二）專家們認為：對付交通違例，需要增加警察（可能不是用同等訓練的警察），增加法庭，增加罰款。

（十三）專家們推薦：用雷達攝影機的設備，來應付交通的黑點。

（十四）專家們認為：行人的障礙物要大量增加，使行人不能隨意橫過馬路而遭受危險。

（十五）專家們認為：法庭過去不大願意過於懲罰交通失事的人，因為法庭認為駕車失事的人，是犯了「社會性的罪」，而不是蓄意犯了刑事上的罪惡。但在會議後，法官可能另外一種看法，因是懲罰過於輕微，一切的交通運動及努力，將會白費。





## Housing Problems in Hongkong

Raymond Y. K. Kan, Cabinet Secretary, Lions International District 303, Chartered Architect and Urban Council Candidate, spoke about the housing problems in Hongkong at the Regular Dinner Meeting of the Lions Club of Happy Valley on Tuesday, 25th February 1969, at 7.00 p.m.

"Lion President David Lee, and Fellow Lions.

"In the recent years, the Government has done much in the fields of low-cost housing and resettlement. The efforts of the Housing Authority is especially noted, from the opening of the North Point Estate in 1955, which contained less than 2,000 flats, to the present total of 16 estates containing 47,000 homes of about 270,000 people. (Among the sixteen, 8 were built by the Housing Authority itself, while the others were built by the P.W.D. according to the Government's low-cost housing scheme.) Ping Shek Estate, which is built this year, will contain 4,560 units and 29,108 people. This excellent record is not only appreciated by the general public, but also has won praises from all over the world. As a result of the popularity of the low-cost housing estates, the authority is now building another four in Kwai Chung at a cost of \$220,000,000. Work is expected to complete in or before the middle of 1974, when 250,000 people will have new homes.

"I wish to take this opportunity to make a few suggestions to the government:—

(1) To cope with the present inclination and the rapidly increasing population, more efforts should be made to provide even more houses, instead of feeling contented with the present housing scheme, so as to give each and every citizen a more ideal living condition. According to the Housing Authority's report 1967-68,

the 42,000 families living in low-cost housing estates were all uninfluenced during the disturbances. This shows people are not willing to give up favourable and secure living conditions. Therefore, these estates are not only a solution to the problem of providing people with living space, but also an important factor to a stable society.

"(2) It is a Chinese tradition that, the occupier of a house feels a wish to be its owner. To foster a sense of belonging to Hongkong among local residents. It is a good measure, besides allocating some flats to people I have just mentioned who contributes to the society, to set up a system of long-term hire-purchase, by which the occupiers can eventually become owners. Some time ago, the authority expressed that there are difficulties in carrying out this system, but it had not been disclosed where the difficulties lie and the possible solutions. In view of the fact that the Hongkong Land Enterprise Ltd. makes profit through a hire-purchase system of sale of its Tai On Building in Shauiwan, the government should also be able to do the same, with its advantage over the cost of land. To solve the housing problem of their people, some countries in Southeast Asia are now building large numbers of national housings. People can buy these houses with long-term payments and at minimum interest. There is no reason why Hongkong should not follow suit.

"(3) 15% of the low-cost housing flats are reserved for civil servants.

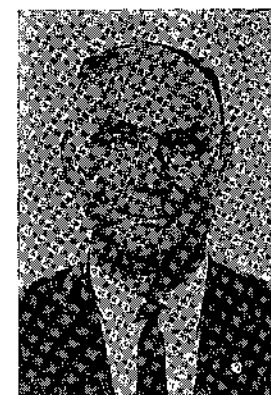
I feel a percentage should also be allocated to persons who contribute a great deal towards the society, such as low-paid and retired teachers, members of social service organisations, civil aids service, auxiliary police, auxiliary medical service, etc. They should be given priority when applying for these flats, for they have done much for the stability and prosperity of our community. This policy will be a sign of encouragement.

"(4) The term "low-cost" housing speaks for itself, and it is against its original principle to increase rents in order to have more flats built. Government should raise the limit of the loan to the Hongkong Housing Committee (which is now \$260,000,000), by say additional \$20,000,000 each year, so as to build more flats without affecting the rent of the existing ones.

"(5) To centralize first-rate talents and increase efficiency, I suggest that the three departments, Resettlement, Housing Authority and the Hongkong Housing Committee be merged into one for the exchange of experience, reducing operational costs and achieving uniformed facilities. Research on the development of resettlement estates and experiments on scientific building methods are obviously better carried out by the three departments together than separately.

"These suggestions are rational and practicable. The Government should promptly consider them and achieve an ideal housing scheme for Hongkong."

## Pen Portrait - Gus Borgeest



Gus Borgeest

Our Man of the Month is genial and swarthy Gus Borgeest, whose Penta-ethnological background of English, German, Italian, Danish and Portuguese descent could easily qualify him for a one man United Nation assembly.

Gus was born in October, 1909, in Ningpo (made famous by the quip "Gone to Ningpo more far"), but there is little in his physique and unfurrowed features to show that he has left sixty years of fulsome life behind him.

Gus spent most of his life in Shanghai where he had his early education, at the famed St. Francis Xavier's College. Thereafter, he pinched hit for nearly four years at the White Collar trade. What followed was entirely different for he donned dungarees and labored for 4 years at farms and sheep stations in Queensland, Australia.

He returned to China in 1931 and stayed put in Shanghai for nearly 20 years, where Gus worked in a leading British textile mill. Retired in 1950, Gus spent a year in nearby Hangchow, noted for its scenic beauty. After a year's sojourn there, he came to Hongkong in 1951 with wife Mona (they were married in 1933) and an adopted child, Naomi.

### Ramon Magsaysay Award

It was in Hongkong that Gus Borgeest made his mark to win a coveted recognition, The Ramon Magsaysay Award, sometimes called "The Nobel Prize of the East". This Award, established in 1958, was in honor of President Ramon Magsaysay of the Republic of The Philippines, who was killed in an air crash in March, 1957. The Award is for outstanding performance in Community Leadership, Government Service, International Understanding, Journalism & Literature and Public Service.

In 1953 Gus and wife Mona, affected by the plight of the thousands of refugees who had come from the Mainland of which they themselves were no exceptions, secured from a sympathetic Government the lease of a 160 acre island which they named Sunshine Island. At \$148.- as annual rent, the Government thought it got a good bargain for a piece of land which "could grow nothing but failure". The indomitable Gus proved it otherwise, as the refugees that he took on did make it yield food.

Gus and Mona toiled for ten years and the hundreds of people who helped themselves on this once barren atoll found a new joy through self-help and productive work.

The miracle of Sunshine Island soon spread far and wide and it must have come as a great surprise to the self-effacing Gus to read an article in the June 1957 issue of the Readers' Digest entitled "Isle of Hope in Hongkong", about the Borgeests and their Sunshine Islanders. The report and eulogy ended with these stirring words:—

"One of the many Americans who have visited Sunshine Island is Prof. Theodore Herman of Colgate University. He reports: "Gus Borgeest does not differ from most of us in believing that God calls us to a life of loving service. He does differ from most of us in having acted on that belief."

Gus Borgeest received the Ramon Magsaysay Award for Community Leadership on August 31, 1961, an honor deservedly earned. It is interesting to recall that five other Hongkong residents received this Award, prominent amongst which were the Lawrence and Horace Kadooric brothers, for Community Leadership; and Mr. Kaiser Sung, for Journalism & Literature.

As a Lion, Gus is comparatively "young", as he joined the Host Club in February, 1966, but we have great faith in this robust Lion. (B.B.)

## Address Given to the Kowloon Lions Club Feb. 14, 1969 by Mr Lorenzo Lo Past President of the Club

*Editor's Note: The address was given by Mr. Lo in a private capacity, and the views and comments were the personal ones of Mr. Lo.*

Fellow Lions:

When I was a little boy I once asked my father the real meaning of the word "Gentleman". He pondered a little and said, "I cannot tell you what it is to be a gentleman; but to illustrate: If you are sitting behind a screen where you can hear me, but cannot see me, and I am talking to many people, some of whom, in a social sense, are my superiors, and some, again in a social sense, are my inferiors, and if you can tell, by my tone of voice, when I am talking to my superiors or to my inferiors, then you may say that I am not a gentleman.

You may ask what this has to do with Hong Kong?

Well, I have said many times before, and I am more than ever convinced, that the government of Hong Kong and the community of Hong Kong has the greatest record of achievement of any government and community in the world. I am intensely proud to be associated with and to be a part of Hong Kong. One of the strengths of Hong Kong is the degree of harmony existing between the people here. It is one of the most classless societies in Asia—there is good race relations—and the old colonial attitudes (I sometimes call it the "Opium War Mentality") among English and Chinese alike has virtually disappeared. We live in a society of considerable mutual respect and tolerance.

With one glaring exception—and this relates to my original story.

There is still one shocking remnant of colonialism left in Hong Kong which is suffered and endured by thousands of people every day. This is nothing new, but it is appalling, and I feel sure all of you, whether Chinese or not, agree with me, that many of our Chinese personnel in the Hong Kong civil service at the lower levels of

bureaucracy, have five distinct tones of voice in dealing with the public. The tones depend on race, mode of dress, and the knowledge of English.

You all know the five tones, but let me enumerate them to you:

**Tone 1.** Reserved for the obviously lower class Chinese, rather poorly dressed, with no knowledge of English. This tone is arrogant, brusque, and quite rude. It is often accompanied by an appalling air of disdain and contempt, and with a deliberate delay in any attention or service given to him.

**Tone 2.** This is reserved for the better dressed Chinese, of somewhat higher class, but with little or no knowledge of English. The tone is a little less rude, but still arrogant, perhaps with less contempt, but still accompanied by an air of disdain and slow attention.

**Tone 3.** This tone is for the well dressed Chinese with a good knowledge of English who probably has some influence and would not hesitate to complain. The tone becomes somewhat more courteous, but with an undertone of resentment, but careful not to offend.

**Tone 4.** Is the one used for non-Chinese in general. The tone now becomes very courteous, almost deferential, and attention and service becomes speedy and efficient.

**Tone 5.** The ultimate tone, is the one reserved for the non-Chinese superiors, and it is a tone almost nauseating in its deference and downright subservience.

You all recognize the picture, because you have all lived with it for many years, and somehow you tolerate and accept it, probably because you are mostly treated to Tone 3, and are thankful you are not in the Tone 2 and 1 categories.

I have not the slightest doubt that those in charge of our civil service, both English and Chinese alike, would be the very first to desire that this remnant of colonialism should be wiped out for the sake of Hong Kong and for the sake of the future of our community.

We who have known and studied colonialism in the past know that the worst aspect and the worst practitioners of colonialism have always been those natives raised by the colonial powers to some little authority. They are the ones who have treated their own people the worst.

During the International Settlement days in Shanghai, the worst elements were our own Chinese policemen with the Indian policemen coming next. During the Japanese occupation our Chinese turn-coats were the most to be feared, with the Koreans and the Formosans following close behind. To a lesser degree, but along the same principles, the people who meted out the worst treatment to the Chinese in the U.S. Consulates, formerly in China and also now here in Hong Kong, were the Chinese employees of the U.S. Consulates.

Hong Kong has moved a long way in the last 2 decades. Last year the Secretary of State for the Commonwealth said during his visit to Hong Kong that except for Hong Kong's geographical and political position, she, Hong Kong, would by now have been a nation with its own representative in the United Nations. The Sing Tao Yat Pao also said last

year that Hong Kong was moving in fact from a status of a colony towards the status of a dominion. And Hong Kong without a doubt will continue to move in this direction.

But if there is going to be a closer ties between Government and the community, the colonial vestige of the five tones of many of our Chinese in the Hong Kong civil service at the lower ranks serving the public must be eliminated. Nothing breeds greater resentment—nothing is a stronger reminder of the colonial past—nothing keeps the Chinese community and Government further apart.

It is intolerable in our great society of Hong Kong today that thousands of our people are daily submitted to the humiliation and denial of their self-respect by Tone 1. Even Shakespeare recognized this treatment as one of the major frustrations of living when he said, "For who would bear the whips and scorns of time—the oppressor's wrong, the proud man's contumely—the insolence of office"—and yet this is repeated every day here in Hong Kong. Most of you, if not all of you, have at one time or another, gone home from such an experience, seething with anger and frustration, and because of our peculiar and special background and history in Hong Kong, you have used the expressing, "Chou Kow" (meaning "Running Dog") or the equivalent, in your anger.

If Hong Kong is to move forward to become a community of excellence

with a sense of identity and pride, Government at the highest level must not delay in formulating a strong and comprehensive programme to eliminate this disgraceful and shameful attitude of many Chinese in the civil service towards the Chinese community.

In fact, it is my opinion that nothing will win the affection and respects of the people of Hong Kong for their government more surely, more rapidly, and more enduringly, than such a programme to eliminate the last vestige of colonialism in Hong Kong.

Exactly how this can be done I am not entirely sure, but from my experience in communication and persuasion, I feel that a public programme through all media of publicity, i.e. press, television, radio, rediffusion, cinema, theatres, etc. poking some gentle fun of the five tones, and pointing out how Hong Kong's progress and community spirit is being hindered by the five tones, would be very effective.

If it is possible to illustrate dramatically to our Chinese in the civil service at the lower levels through public media that they are not only offending the individual dignity of their fellow citizens in the community, but are also exposing their own lack of dignity, manners, and self-respect, this perhaps will make them realize that they, and not the non-Chinese administration, are perpetuating colonialism in Hong Kong, and holding back the cooperation and close ties

members in efforts to promote greater loyalty and devotion to Lionism in the service of our Hongkong community".

The threefold purpose of the gathering was spelled out by Lion M. Hassa as Chairman of the Ladies' Night Committee: "to raise funds for the needy, to have the pleasure of meeting our Lionesses and friends and also to bid farewell to our Past President Lion Stanley Wang and Lioness Julie who are leaving Hongkong next month for New York".

Mr. and Mrs. Wang were presented with an ivory elephant as a farewell token. They left Hongkong on March 2.

between the Chinese community and Government which is so essential to the future well-being and, in fact, to the future survival of Hong Kong.

Before I close I wish to say that the above does not, of course, apply to all our Chinese in the civil service at any level, many of whom are devoted, dedicated, and with a genuine public spirit of public service in the highest tradition. To them I pay tribute. Regrettably, however, there are a sufficiently significant number not in this category to make the problem outlined in my talk, a major crisis factor in the relationship of Government with the community.

I wish to close with a strong plea to Government to give recognition to this problem, so frequently swept under the carpet, and to formulate a programme of education, enlightenment, and persuasion. The plea also goes out to our people in the civil service to recognize and acknowledge that there is this problem; and to establish the value of the dignity of each and every individual in the community in the minds of our civil servants. And my last plea goes to you, my fellow Lions, for each of you to do your share to make Hong Kong a place where each member of the community, at whatever level and class of society, may expect to live and work with a sense of individual dignity and self-respect, and may expect the courtesy and consideration that any human being is entitled to in a civilized mature society.

Thank you.

From Down Under, the Lions Club of Enfield South Australia has drawn our attention to a remarkable 28-year old woman, Miss Coralie De Garis, who has been going considerably out of her way to help destitute refugee children in Hongkong. Her unstinted efforts finally won recognition from our fellow Lions of Enfield who have appointed her their representative in the Colony with powers to act on the Club's behalf.

Kowloon Lions minded to give her any moral support or encouragement are referred to the Leprosy Mission where she is employed. The address is: Hay Ling Chau Leprosarium, P.O. Box 380, Hong Kong.

And from Tanzania, the Lions Club of Shinyanga wishes to obtain a handsome collection of Hongkong manufactured articles, such as toys, clothes and sports goods as well as luxury or household items like clocks, wrist watches, fountain pens, lamps and electrical appliances, Chinese decorations, photo frames, etc. It's for their first large venture—a Grand Lions Fete to be held in the first week of May.

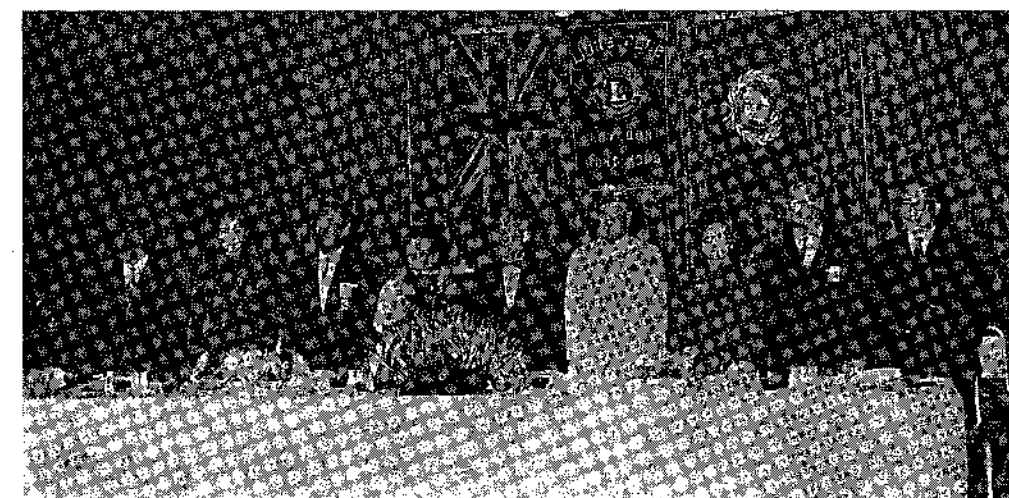
## Message for the Joint Charity Ball Souvenir Programme April 24, 1969

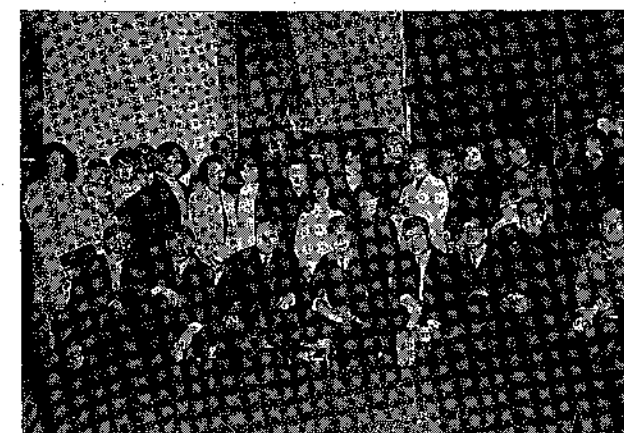

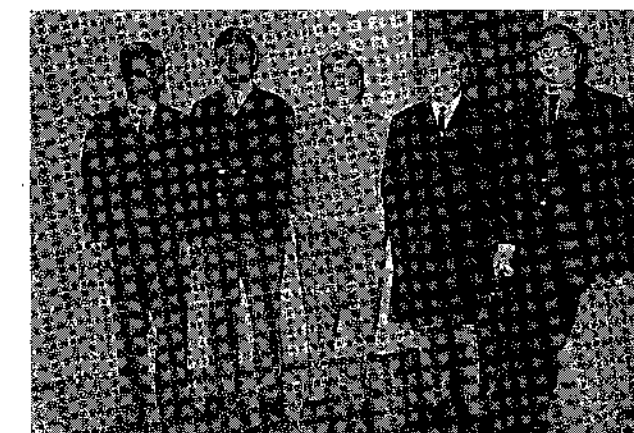

### 4. Speakers at the Regular Luncheon Meetings.

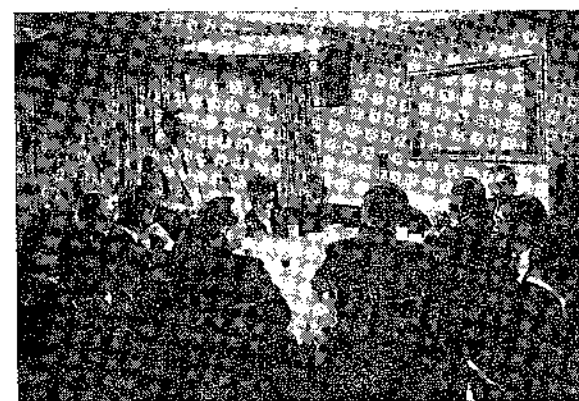

At our Regular Luncheon Meeting on 12th March, 1969 Lion Francis Pan, Chairman of the Hong Kong

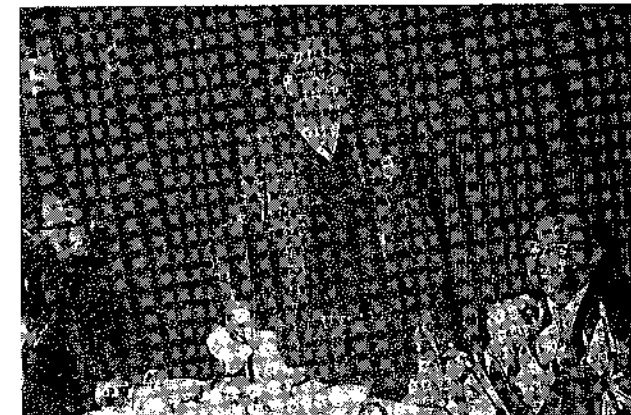

### 5. Lions from the Philippines.

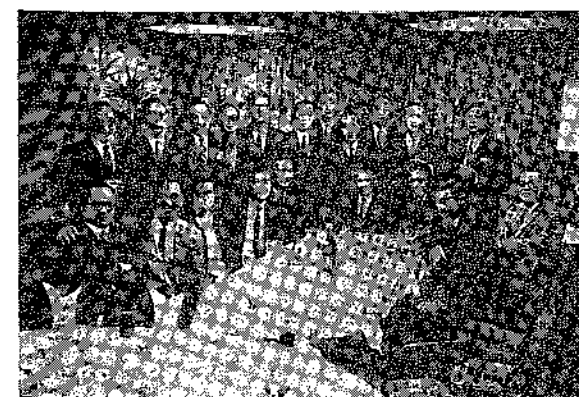

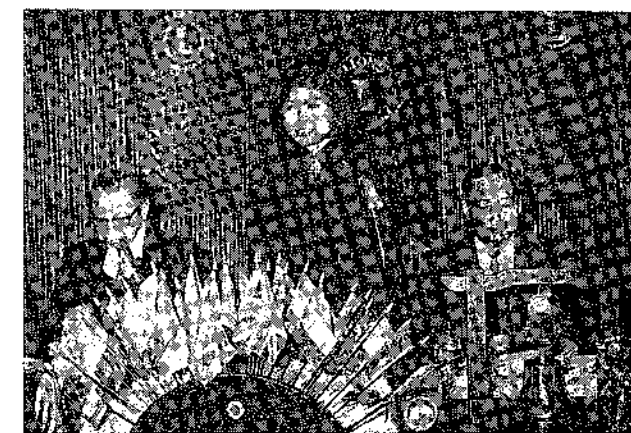
Lion Henry Tong Lian Shu, President of the Las Pinas Lions Club singing at the dinner party.

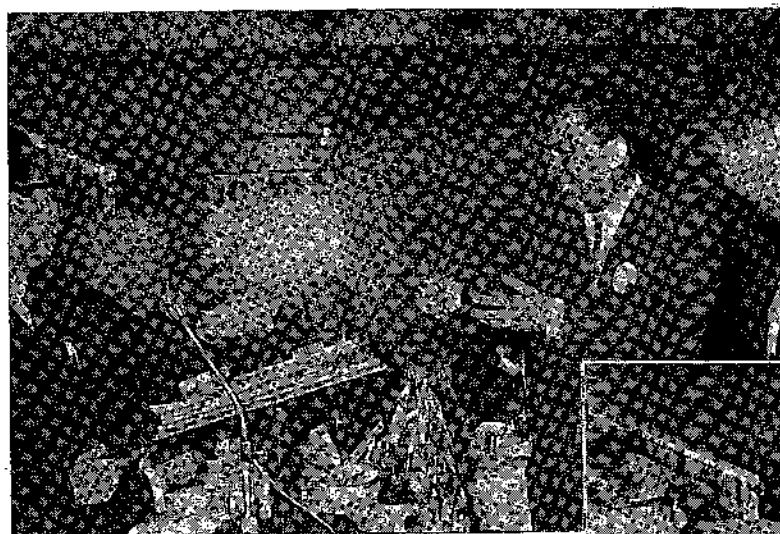

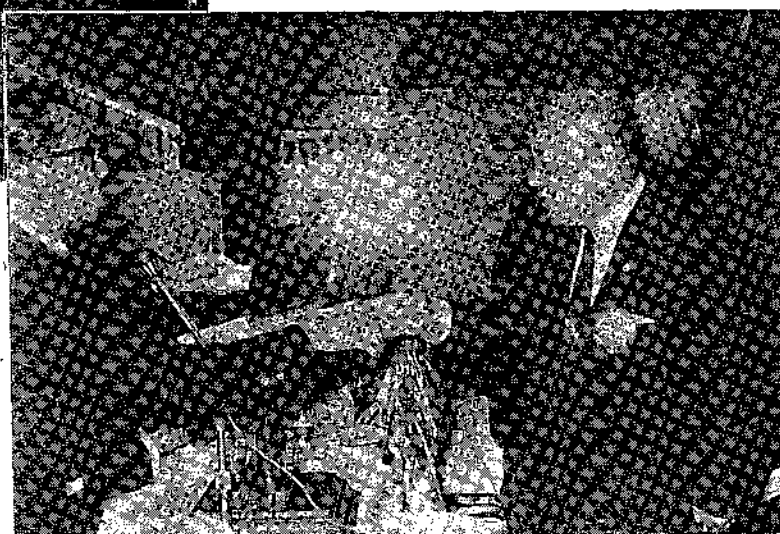

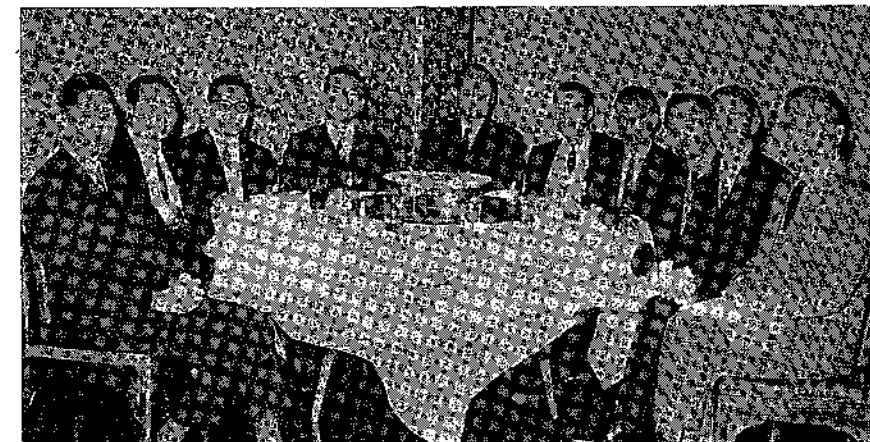

太平山獅子會於三月十三日下午一時假座文華酒店松鶴廳舉行午餐例會，由會長黃文謙主持，邀請香港差餉物業估價署署長谷基（Mr. N. Cooke）作專題演講，講題為「一九六九年空置樓宇」到該會音長及會員李文彬、陳百強、余頌平、陳超常、謝柱祥、陳漢英、鄒振猷、林世深、梁陸、文洪礎、劉保光、余緒麟、黃卓文、劉志文、王得毅、利樹源、董樑、歐永傑、文耀芳、曾端熙、龐欽瑞、林少華、方潤華、陳大新、霍寶生、何世柱、郭中興、沈浩榮、王炳文、葉謀迪、黃宏光、黃廣惠、陳樹基、林建勳、林樹基，暨到訪獅友李國賢、龔甲龍等數十人。

首由黃文謙會長宣佈開會，陳漢華報告出席人數到介紹到會嘉賓，李文彬領導唱獅子歌後，即分別由黃會長，林世深、劉保光各獅兄報告全港九個獅子會聯合慈善餐舞會籌備近況，並宣佈本月份欣逢劉保光獅兄快樂生辰，由全體合唱生日歌及致送禮物以示祝賀。

差餉物業估價署署長隨在熱烈掌聲中起立演講曲氏首先指出，截止一九六八年底全港居住樓宇為二十六萬四千單位，空置樓宇僅為七千二百八十二單位，此一數字為自一九六三年以來最少者。查一九六三年全港空置樓宇為三千五百單位，至一九六四年增至八千，一九六五年因銀行風關係潮

，增一萬一千五百，一九六六年更因社會經濟關係，竟增至一萬八千五百一十九單位。本年度此項空置樓宇銳減足以反映本港經濟情況已大為好轉。

去年度港九新建之居住樓宇為九千八百四十一單位，但至本年一月底，其未租售有僅約四分之一。事實上，此項新建樓宇，實包括各大規模之建築計劃，如筲箕灣之太安樓，荔枝角之美孚新村等在內。去年售出之樓宇，以在三萬元左右者最為暢銷，租賃情形亦然，至於高價樓宇比較上仍未符理想。但差餉數字現下已大為增加了。

至於瞻望一九六九年之樓宇建設情形，大致看好，預計本年度建築完成之樓宇約為八千單位，此一數字較之近十年內之平均數一萬七千為低，故租賃情況，必能大大改善，尤以售價三萬以下，租值五百元以下者為然。

鑒於香港日趨安定繁榮，工業生產及進出口數字增加，旅遊事業日趨蓬勃，社會一般經濟能力已大為好轉，故物業前途，一片光明可為預卜，有志投資者宜藉此機會作通盤計劃及進一步之發展。

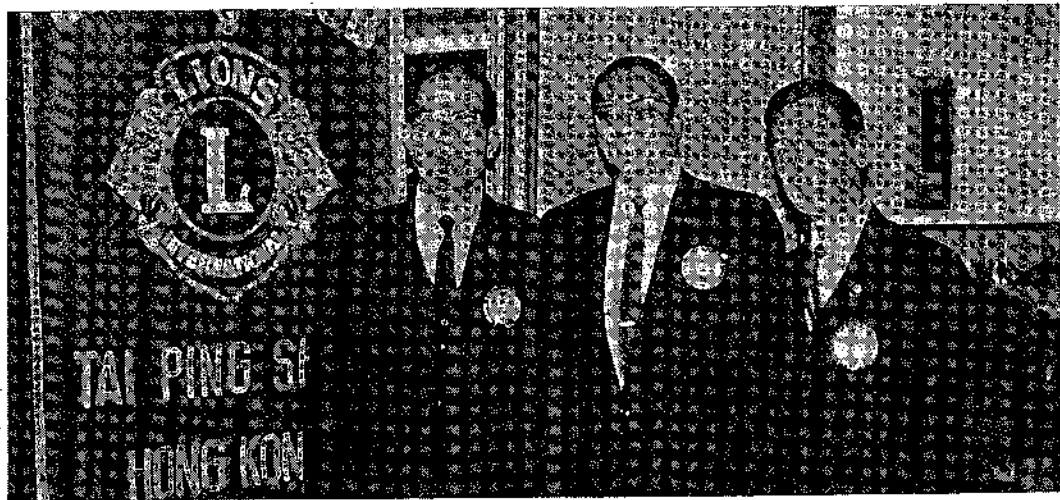

## 會訊

### (一)

本會於二月廿五日下午八時，假座香港豪華樓舉行晚餐常會及新年團拜，到有本會獅兄及嘉賓日本醫學博士代田稔等五十餘人，濟濟一堂，喜洋溢。

雄雞一鳴天下白，隨着本港日臻繁榮，各行各業正蓬勃發展，值茲雞年伊始，象徵着前途無限光明，常會在獅兄們互頌好運的熱烈氣氛中進行。

席上並由嘉賓日本醫學博士代田稔先生，作有關乳酸素——多酵母奶，對人體的醫學價值，及對人類健康的貢獻。

### (二)

三月四日，本會假座香港希爾頓酒店舉行午餐常會，邀請嘉賓——香港棉紡業公會主席吳文政先生，蒞臨作專題演講。

### 「香港的紡織工業」

香港，今日已成為遠東最繁盛，最進步的一個城市，應歸功於香港之能很迅速地發展工業化。但香港整個工業化的進程，則可以說是由於紡織工業驚工人的發展所刺激起來的，或可以說是引導起來的，為了證明這一點，我想舉列一下貿易與就業的數字，香港工業從海外市場所賺的兩錢中，有一塊來自紡織品，香港工業所僱用的勞工，每五個人中，有二個人是屬於紡織的。

香港之真正有紡織業開始於一九四七年，第一家紡織廠是大南紗廠，紗錠為四千枚，一九四八年有六家棉紡廠相繼創立，擁有紗錠十一萬枚，至一九五一年遞增至十一家，共有紗錠十七萬八千枚，以後陸續推進發展到一九六九年一月，香港有紗廠三十家，共有紗錠八十萬枚，年產各種支數棉紗三億二千萬磅，自動布機二萬三千七百，各年產棉布八億方碼，棉紡業投資額約為港幣六億元。

香港的紗廠所添置的機器設備，都是一流現代化的，廠房全部自動調節空氣，香港的紗廠，從一九五八年，即實

行八小時三班制，使機器得到充份利用，故每一紗錠的運轉時數，在世界上以最高着稱。

香港出產的紡織品，百份之九十是外銷，本銷市場僅佔百份之十，初期的外銷對象是東南亞，主要買主是印尼，菲律賓等，其後，這些國家本身發展紡織工業而減少進口，因環境轉變，乃向歐美市場開拓，提高品質，踏入先進國家的市場，到現在，因香港出品的款式高雅，手工精緻，在海外市場深得買家的信心，從前有以產品貼上Empire Made為標誌的，現在都改用Hong Kong Made為標誌了。

香港的紡織品因質好價廉，銷路不斷擴大，於是引致一九五七年的英國限額談判，每年輸英棉布限於億八千五百萬方碼，一九六一年，美國亦提出限額，於是年十一月簽訂，現在每年限額為三億八千九百萬方碼，在此同時期中，加拿大，挪威，西德等國家，相繼限制香港棉織品入口，這些限額措施，在長遠來說，對香港棉織品的發展是有阻力的，幸而有秩序的發展本受重大影響，而且現在香港的紡織業已從棉製高品質的生產漸漸向人造纖維混紡發展，如P. P. 特麗翎等產品，製造成的襯衫褲子，可以免燙免熨，他們的銷路，遠達世界三十九個國家，這是一個新的方向，他的前途十分光明遠大。

關於限額的事，本人有一個感想，香港是一個自由港，世界上任何國家進入香港的貨品，尤其是先進國家英國，美國，加拿大，德國等國家的貨品，都受到香港的歡迎，既不怕會實施限額，亦不須耽心要付關稅，而另一方面，香港都面臨出口上各方面的限制威縮，而同時任何人都清楚知道，香港是東南亞自由經濟體系的前哨，必須依靠出口才能够生存，如果我們對國際貿易如此不公平的待遇而讓之命運使然，本人覺得這是極不公道的，本人希望政府能迅速訂立工業政策，來領導工業進一步的經營穩定。

總之，香港人對工業之奮鬥精神，至足欽佩。本人對工業家們的才智，勇氣，與孜孜不倦的毅力，因而造成目前香港經濟成長與普通繁榮，在此表示敬意，本人深信香港出口貿易由於創造新的產品及開拓新的市場必能繼續發展，同時，紡織工業應繼續堅持努力以爭取更高領域的進步。

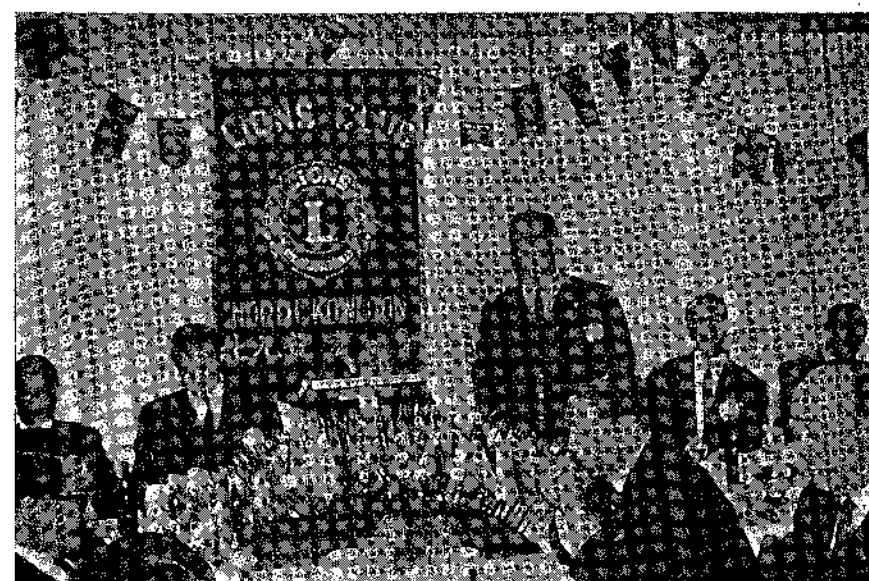

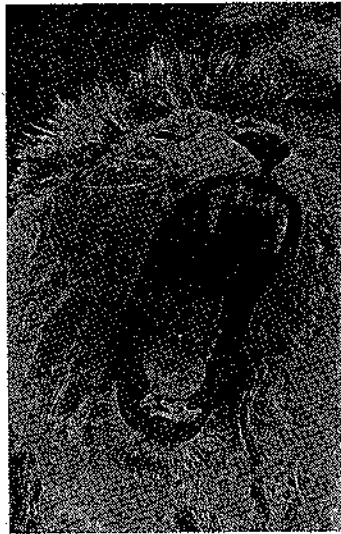

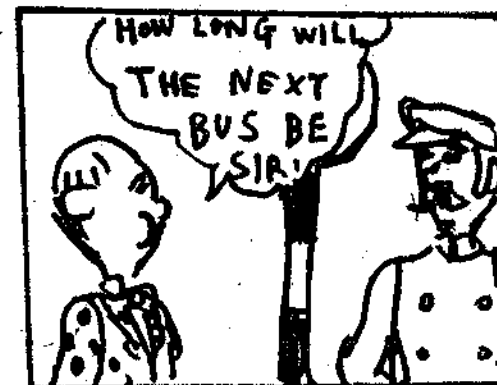
