

The Talker, The Taciturn And The Tasker

In our daily lives, we often encounter people who have an ingrained habit to monopolize or domineer the conversation. You see this type in social and business gatherings. Rarely do they contribute anything interesting, much less informative, to the listeners. Their eyes are apt to become glazed and betray disinterest if the conversation is drawn away from them.

In our meetings, be they club or district ones, it is not uncommon to find one who fits this description. Generally he is a late comer and as if to catch up with what he has missed, he loses precious little time to disgorge himself. Like as not, he will unravel a point or underscore another which has already been done. It is difficult to explain his reluctance to articulate unless it is in deference to the worthy whom we described earlier. Or is he a practitioner of the saying that in order to keep your nose clean it is best that you keep your mouth shut?

Our rampage now takes us to the last of our titlists, the Tasker. This one practices a little of both, conversation and silence, balancing them nicely. At meetings, he is punctuality personified. This presupposes interest in, and awareness of, his assignment. He probably has his work completed and is ready to unwrap it when his turn comes. He is rarely known to make an excuse. The tasker is an activist. He gets things done. We can do with more of this type. We don't like to pun in this case.

Honor Thy Clothing

Lion John Poon, District Governor Elect, in his message to the Lions of this District, published in this issue, touched on a salient point concerning his office. He spoke sagely when he said that the garb of the District Governor is not so much an honor bestowed on him as it is for him to honor the garb. Well Spoken. To respect the badge of office and not use it for personal glorification is what earns the organization which the badge represents the esteem, trust and admiration of the public. We know this dedicated Lion will uphold the great tradition of his office. Good luck, John.

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

The District Office was opened in November, 1968. This means that in the 30 working weeks in this period, the room was used 3 times each week on the average.

Signing Off

It is with mixed feelings and perhaps relief that I conclude this "News" for the last time. The next issue will be handled by a capable Lion to be named by our new District Governor.

May I take this opportunity to thank all Lions who have so ardently supported our own magazine which is the product of combined efforts and which undoubtedly helps the promotion and acceleration of our movement in this part of the world.

District Governor Hilton's Report for term of office

Fellow Lions:

As you are aware, the District Governor's term of office does not expire until the end of June. Therefore, at today's District Convention, I propose to give you a summary of the District Governor's Report for the Year.

A more detailed Report will be made available to all Lions in the District after June.

Membership

The total membership of the nine Lions' Clubs within District 303 stood at 486 members at the end of April, 1969. While all Clubs were encouraged to recruit new members from the various professions and different walks of life in order to strengthen the Lions movement in Hong Kong, they were at the same time exhorted not to allow delinquent members who failed to attend meetings regularly to have their names kept permanently on the Membership Roster, unless there were valid reasons. I am happy to report that during the past year, all Clubs within the District have done their utmost to maintain the high quality of membership for which Lionism is known in Hong Kong.

Projects

Since July 1st, 1968 up to the present, a total of nine projects were approved by the District Projects Committee totalling \$105,000.00.

All projects were carefully selected by the Projects Committee, and they can be accepted as being of permanent value to the community.

A sum of nearly \$200,000 still remains available for the building of the Lions Morning-hill School for the Handicapped. The building of this School had been held up due to difficulty in obtaining a suitable site. In addition, there is an allocated balance of about \$150,000 for future District projects.

1969 Joint Charity Ball

Under the able Chairmanship of Lion Simon Lee, the 1969 Joint Charity Ball was held on April 24, 1969 at the Hilton Hotel under the distinguished patronage of His Excellency the Governor and Lady Trench. Approximately \$250,000. was raised. Over

one hundred Lions and Lionesses actively participated in this fund-raising drive.

Fellowship and Sister Alliances

During the year, most of the Clubs in the District held joint meetings with other Clubs in order to promote fellowship. Also, the District organised a number of tea parties at the District Office at which all Lions were invited to attend to get to know each other better.

We have now a total of six Lions Clubs with Sister Alliances with Clubs in Taiwan and the Philippines. During the 1968-1969 term, it has been the policy of the District to encourage all Clubs to preserve an even balance between Lions community activities and Lions fellowship.

District Office

In the closing months of immediate Past District Governor Lion Paul Lau's administration, plans were made to purchase a District Office. Due to the efforts of the Chairman and Members of the Ad Hoc District Office Committee and District Management Committee, we now have a fine and well-equipped District Office at Yip Fung Building. This Office is the home and centre of Lions activity at the District level. It is where the "Hong Kong Lion" is edited. It is where many individual clubs hold their Board of Directors meetings. It has proved extremely useful during the planning and preparation period for the 1969 Joint Charity Ball.

The "Hong Kong Lion"

The monthly "Hong Kong Lion" has been one of the main sources of keeping all Lions in the District informed of District activities as well as the activities of other Clubs. Many senior Lions have sacrificed much time and effort to ensure that the publication comes out on time, with a minimum of advertisements, all donated by Lions.

Conventions

About 50 Lions, Lionesses and observers represented Hong Kong at the Seventh Orient and Southeast Asia Lions Convention which was held in Manila in November, 1968.

Also, extensive preparations have been in hand for many months for our District's participation in the Lions' International Convention which will be held in July this year in Tokyo.

Extension

The Lions Club of Hong Kong (Host) has for the past few months been preparing the groundwork to form a new club, to be known as the Kwun Tong Lions Club. It is hoped that this new Club, which will be Cantonese-speaking, will be chartered within the next two to three months.

Lions Handbook in Chinese

A District Handbook on Lionism in Chinese is being prepared and will be printed and distributed to Chinese-speaking members sometime within the next two months.

Formation of Leo Clubs

Two Leo Clubs were sponsored during the year:

- (1) Leo Club Hong Kong (Host) which was inaugurated on 14th December, 1968.
- (2) Leo Club of Tai Ping Shan which was inaugurated on 12th January, 1969.

Youth Exchange

During the past year, Lion Halleck Rose, Chairman of the Youth Exchange Committee, had to resign due to ill-health, and Lion Bert Hope became Chairman of the Committee. Several young Australians were hosted by the District with the assistance of a number of the Clubs. These young Australians were sent under the sponsorship of Lions Clubs in Australia.

District Convention Night

At the District Night which will be held this evening, I hope that all Lions present will be able to attend together with their Lionesses and other friends. During the gaiety and fellowship that will take place, a presentation of District and Joint Charity Ball awards will be made.

Leadership Forum

The Lions Leadership Forum will be held at the Hilton Hotel on June 7, 1969. This Forum promises to be one of the best ever and all Lions are cordially invited to attend. It is mandatory that those Lions who are assuming office during the 1969-1970 administration should participate in the Leadership Forum.

Appreciation

During my administration as District Governor for the 1968-1969 term, I have sought to achieve a harmonious balance between District and individual club activity without over-taxing the energies and resources of our Lions. It implements the theme-note of our administration of "Community Service and Fellowship through Lionism".

May I conclude this summary report by expressing my appreciation to all members of the District 303 Cabinet, the District Committee Chairmen, Deputy Chairmen, and Committee members, and to all Club Presidents and individual Lions for the tremendous support which they gave during my administration to enable Lionism to play its part in serving the Hong Kong community. Ours is a service organisation of which we can feel proud to belong to as it is the largest and most dynamic service organization of our times.

張有興總監區務報告

各位獅兄:

各位都知道,總監之職要到六月底才告滿任,所以在今天的本區年會,我只能給一個撮要的區務報告,過了六月底,我將會作一個較詳細的報告。

會員:

根據本年四月底的統計,三〇三區的九個獅子會會員人數共為四百八十六人,各會很努力的從各方面選請新的會員以加強在香港的獅子活動,同時更盡力制裁掛名而不出席例會之會員,本人非常的告慰,就是在這一年中,本區內各會對會員質素,保持着本港素仰的高度水準。

服務工作:

從一九六八年七月一日到現在,工作計劃組已通過九個服務工作,合共壹拾萬伍千元。

所有服務工作都經過工作計劃組很小心的選擇,對社會俱有永久性的價值。

還有式十萬元保留着為建築「獅子會晨山弱能兒童學校」之用,因為選擇校址困難,致建築工程受拖延。

此外,尚存約壹拾伍萬元為將來服務工作之用。

一九六九年慈善餐舞會：

本年度之聯合慈善餐舞會得港督戴麟趾爵士及夫人贊助及參加，在舞會主席李國賢獅兄領導之下，在四月廿九日成功的舉行，共籌得慈款將及式十五萬元，超過一百位獅兄和獅嫂會熱誠踴躍參加這個籌款的工作。

聯誼及姊妹會結盟：

本年中，有很多會與別會舉辦聯合例會以增加友會間之聯誼，同時，本區亦會在區辦事處舉行多次之茶會，邀請獅兄參加，以加彼此間之認識。

目前，已有六個會與台灣及菲律賓之友會締結姊妹會聯盟。

本屆任內，本區之政策，乃鼓勵各會對社會活動及獅友間之友誼，兩者保持並重。

區辦事處：

在上屆總監劉邦獅兄任內之最後數月，會籌劃購置區辦事處會址，由籌購會址委員會及會址管理組之努力，我們現在在業豐大廈有一所裝置完善之辦事處，「香港獅聲」的編輯，和各會的董事會議，就是在此辦事處舉行，聯合慈善餐舞會的籌備和組織，也就是充份的利用這個地方來工作。

「香港獅聲」：

「香港獅聲」月刊，是供給各會關於本區的一切活動及各會的動態之消息的重要工具之一，有許多位先進獅兄們，貢獻他們的時間和力量，使這本月刊按月得依時出版及招接每期最底限度的告白。

大會：

去年十一月在峴尼拉舉行之第七屆東南亞獅子大會，本區會約有五十名獅兄嫂代表香港出席。

還有，今年七月在東京舉行之世界獅子大會，數月來本區亦已積極的籌備出席參加。

擴展：

在過去數月間，香港主會已在籌辦另一新會，這個新會將名官塘獅子會，我們希望這個用粵語的新會，在未來的兩三個月內正式成立。

獅子會中文手冊：

本區正在編印着一本中文的獅子手冊，約在兩個月內出版，分發給講中國語的會員參考。

少獅會成立：

本年內有兩個少獅會成立：

- (一) 香港主會少獅會成立於一九六八年十二月十四日。
- (二) 太平山少獅會成立於一九六九年正月十二日。

青年交換：

去年，青年交換組主席 Halleck Rose 獅兄因健康關係辭職，遺缺由 Bert Hope 獅兄補上。

本區及數獅會會招待多名澳洲青年，這些青年是澳洲區的獅子會資送來香港的。

區聯歡大會：

本年度的區聯歡大會將於今晚舉行，我希望出席今天年會的獅兄們都帶他們的獅嫂和朋友參加。

獅子業務研討會：

獅子業務研討會將於本年六月七日在希爾頓酒店舉行，這次研討會信是歷屆所辦最佳之一次，所以所有的獅兄們都請至要參加，尤其是來屆執行會務的獅兄們更應參加。

謝忱：

在我執行1968—1969年總監之職任內，我曾嘗試建立區與會間一個平衡和諧的活動而同時並不過度的化費獅子業務的資力和力量，以履行我們獅子業務的主題：「以獅子精神為社會服務和友誼」。

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Random Thoughts

My Impression of the Forum

As Chairman of Workshops C1 & C2 I believe that I am qualified to comment on the recent Leadership Forum.

My criticism here may be inclined to be harsh but nevertheless constructive and with the sole intention of making recommendations for improvement in the next Forum.

There was first the change of appointment of chairmen for the different Workshops, then the merge of two Workshops and yet a further combination of more Workshops a few days before the date of the Forum. The last minute change brought some difficulties for the chairmen concerned in adjusting their roles.

Most Workshops had no preparation or held no meetings of their own prior to the Forum. The one or two Workshops which did call meetings had to abandon them because of insufficient attendance. As a result the panelists had to rely a lot on their own wits and led the discussions in an impromptu manner.

The attendance was poor in comparison with that of the previous years. The greater portion of the responsibility fell on the Club Presidents and the lesser portion on the Forum Committee in not notifying or notifying but without sufficient emphasis the individual members who were required to attend by virtue of their status as club officers, directors, committee chairmen or new members.

It is felt that in future, the members required to attend these discussions should be briefed in advance with printed materials supplied by the Forum Committee through the President as regards the time schedule, the procedure and the topics to be discussed in their individual Workshops. Thus a keener interest may be aroused. The individual members would then have a little time to give the topics some thought before attending the Forum and may even be able to bring up new subjects for discussion.

The poor attendance may also be an indication of the lack of interest by the members. This may be due to one or both of the following reasons:

1. The same or similar subjects were being presented for discussion year after year. As most of the club officers, directors and committee chairmen had attended the Forum in the previous years, this might become monotonous.
2. Some of the members, though officers, directors or committee chairmen, were not conversant with the English language or not being able to speak it sufficiently fluent for discussion purpose due to the fact that they belong to non-English speaking clubs.

A complaint was raised in my Workshop that the topics printed had no Chinese version. Due to the presence of a few non-Chinese members in my Workshop, I had to start my opening remarks in English. Though I had emphasized that any language or dialect might be used in the discussion, English was used throughout the entire session. In any case, there was not sufficient time to do any interpretation in the course of the discussion. It was said afterwards that two or three members did not speak because they could not grasp the meaning of events that were going on.

In the coming year it is suggested that either some new subjects are introduced or the form of the Forum may be changed to provide some variety.

The topics should be printed both in English and Chinese or better still each Workshop is divided into two parallel groups, one in English and one in Cantonese.

Even with the merger of the two Workshops C1 & C2, I had in my group the attendance of only 10 members. Two of my colleagues in the panel

were also absent. I was quite disheartened at the start but to my surprise the discussion proceeded with much interest and enthusiasm so much so that we had to run a little over time and still could not finish the topics suggested.

Here again my thoughts are directed to the time allotted to the actual discussion which is the core and the essence of the Forum.

It was pointed out last year that the time devoted to discussion was too limited due to the pressure of time on account of the Convention Night that was to immediately follow. We had about one hour.

This year it was decided to hold the Forum and the Convention Night separately in order to afford ample time for discussion. The time allotted by the printed schedule was 2 hours but later announced at the general assembly to be reduced to 1½ hours.

In spite of the poor attendance in my Workshop we found time to be insufficient to cover the list of topics although the entire session was conducted at a rapid pace. If the attendance had been better,

even more time would be needed. It leads me to wonder whether it is worth the efforts in organising a major event of the year, setting up a committee, holding a number of meetings, requiring the attendance of over 100 members and devoting the whole afternoon just to secure the 1½ hours for group discussion which even with the separation of the Forum and the Convention Night is not much an improvement over last year.

In the next Forum, if to be held in a similar form, a period of 2½ hours should be allotted exclusively for actual discussion.

I have criticised a lot but I also realise the difficult task confronted the Forum Committee in organizing this important event of the year. In my above comments I have made certain suggestions but in some cases I merely pointed out the drawbacks. However, all these are intended to call attention for improvement in a constructive sense. I am sure Lion A. M. Prata, our next Forum Chairman of whose capability and thoroughness I have 100% confidence, will lead us to a successful Forum.

Report of the Publications Committee

The Publications Committee, 1967-69, followed the general policies laid down by the previous District Cabinet with the publication of THE HONGKONG LION in November, 1967.

The Committee comprising of the Chairman, the Chief Editor, Managing Editor and representatives of the District and 9 Clubs held frequent meetings during the year. To this day, the following problems are still outstanding and would require constant attention and improvement.

(1) Editorship:

The Club and District Editors must be prevailed upon to do their respective part with industry and resourcefulness and to adhere to the editing schedule.

(2) Readership:

How the Lions of all Clubs may take an interest in this District publication is up to the Club officers and directors to use their efforts toward effective publicity and promotion.

(3) Finance:

It has not been easy to maintain this expensive monthly publication had it not been for the support from the Advertisers. As a house organ, self support has to be accomplished through equitable contribution and utilization by all members. The present format and printing of the magazine are dictated by considerations of economy and budget provisions.

The following report will help to reflect the operations in detail:

a. Numbers published:

18 issues; November, 1967—April, 1969.

b. Total Expenditure:

\$20,550.60 (excluding administrative charges)

Max. \$1,365.60 (July, 1968)

Min. \$911.40 (April, 1969)

c. Printing Cost:

\$16.25 per page (Since February, 1969)

\$100.00 for the two covers

\$18.00 for wrapping

\$0.40 per sq. in. of blocks

d. Total Revenue from Advertisements:

\$11,120.00

Max. \$1,220.00 (June, 1968)

Min. \$160.00 (April, 1969)

Average \$618.00 per month

e. Total Subscription Received:

\$26,448.00 (@ \$3.00 per copy & \$4.00 an extra copy)

f. Total Copies Printed: 650 per month since February, 1969.

g. Local Postage: 15¢ per copy.

OBSERVATIONS

(1) The fact that the above figures actually show a profit is misleading since office expenses and staff salary had not been included.

(2) There had been a sharp drop in advertisements since February, 1969 due to the impending Charity Ball. Advertisements were generally obtained by personal approach by the Managing Editor and he was fast exhausting his contacts. He did not think that the formation of a committee could help since the load would eventually fall onto the Committee Chairman. He suggested that in future each Club Editor be responsible to bring in at least one half-page advertisement from one of the members of his own Club.

(3) Complaints had been received regarding non-delivery and it is suggested that the Club Editors be requested to watch out for such cases and to notify the office assistant so that immediate replacement could be made and the error corrected without delay.

(4) Clubs were billed quarterly in January, April, July and October each year through the Club Treasurers. The number of members of each Club was adjusted once every three months and no refund

is to be made for any members dropped or resigned during that period, but the surplus copies were placed at the disposal of the Hon. Secretary of the Club concerned. New members would have to purchase their copies at \$4.00 per copy until the beginning of the ensuing quarter at which time they would be included in our mailing list and be charged at the regular \$3.00.

(5) Since the establishment of the District Office and for the sake of expediency, the "H.K. LION" account has been merged with that of the District Office. It was agreed that receipts and payments concerning the magazine would still be channelled through the Managing Editor. A separate subsidiary account would also be prepared to show the operations of the HONG KONG LION.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The Chairman of the Publications Committee would like to take this opportunity to extend his

thanks and appreciation to Lion Buddy Butt, the Chief Editor and Lion P. C. Chau, the Managing Editor, for their unstinting cooperation. Without their support and forbearance the regular publication of the HONG KONG LION would have been impossible.

To all other members on the Committee, the Chairman would also acknowledge with thanks their tolerance and assistance. There were indeed frequent confrontations, though in the most friendly nature, which always settled down to a happy team work.

Life At Middle Age

(A Talk by Dr. Francis K. Pan before the Hong Kong
Toastmasters Club on May 26, 1969 at the Mandarin Hotel)

The moment you notice how people are ageing or growing juvenile in their ways, the moment that colors and glamour seem to take on a new shade, the moment you think and dream more frequently of the departed ones, WATCH OUT, for you are entering or are already at middle age!

It is difficult to define exactly just when is middle age since none of us could count the remaining days of our life. If one knows that he is going to live to 90 to the day, then it is easy to mark off the 45th birthday as the beginning of middle age. But we cannot be that precise. We live differently under different pressures and circumstances. The cycle of 24 hours is spent individualistically. Our work and rest periods also vary. I may suggest therefore that it is strictly a personal equation. There are also subjective and objective concepts of age as well as mental and physical differences in age. Furthermore, age possesses an element of fluidity and transformation, i.e., you may feel young like a child, or robust as an adolescent youth, or resigned as an old man, depending on the environment and stimuli which confront you from hour to hour and from day to day. There is beauty and versatility in middle age, which may be described as the noon day, as the full blossom of a flower, as the first mountain peak and as the second act of a 3-act stage play.

Many of you may refuse to associate with my thinking because you are still young. I was one of them at a time when I was invariably among the youngest in any social gathering, in any meeting or conference that I attended. And like all young men, I was in a hurry. Nothing interested me as much as myself or self-exertion. I was driven by urgency and impatience like a rabbit ready to jump at the lifting of the hat. I was obsessed in getting ahead, almost a kind "a-go-go" craze, not realizing then that time was not eternal. Like a passenger in a house-boat upstream, eager to get somewhere, I did not even look out through the cabin windows to see the goings on and the beautiful scenery along the banks. The journey, though completed, was but a time-out in my life. In a hurry to bring on the future would often blind our eyes to the full enjoyment of the present. What I was trying to say is that we must be conscientious in growing up to our middle age, i.e., to grow abundantly in the fullness of exercise of our

endowed attributes. We cannot grow simply by racing or by waiting. Middle age to be rich must be predicated upon a substantiated youth.

The blessings of a deserving middle age are many. **Number One** we shall have for the first time the enjoyment of a trinity of friendship. We have friends who are older than ourselves by 10 or more years; friends of our own age group; and friends who are younger by 10 or more years. We look for wisdom and guidance from the older ones, for understanding and co-operation even competition with our contemporaries; for inspiration and freshness from our younger ones. Life is incomplete without the communication of this trinity.

Number Two A dimensional point of view becomes a part of our faculty at middle age. There is much in the past we can look back to and there is a vast span of space we can look forward to exploit. We pause to gaze at the mountain peaks above us and below us. We began to know how to measure our steps, to make way for ourselves without stepping on others' toes, and to diagnose a problem in its proper perspective. We acquire a new sense of values toward material and spiritual things. The childish items no longer interest us as much for craving and possession. We seek new toys and past time. We are not as quick and harsh in judgement. We are more patient and tolerant.

Number Three We enter a new age of poetry and romance. Though our sweethearts look older and painted, we have not forgotten their tenderness. And we are nevertheless susceptible to the appealing charm of the nymphettes, i.e., the sweet and young ones, but we are guided by a new code of dos and don'ts. You must have heard how often young girls prefer men of middle age. It is because of their romance seasoned by poetry. The middle age men are as acceptable to the deputants as to the older matrons and dowagers.

Number Four Middle age beholds an opportunity for self-discovery and new decisions. All of a sudden to our grief, we may wake up to realize that we have missed out on this and that. We could have done this and that and would have succeeded had it not been for this and that reason. We may lament and

deplorable that we only lived in imitation of others or we just lived in sacrifice for the sake of others or we have not lived at all. We discover that our hidden talents and abilities, our accumulated experience and know-how, are crying for expression. We may have acquired wealth in some way or other but we lacked health and happiness, reputation and dignity. The fear of old age and death started to descend upon us. It is therefore my last chance to live as I like it. Often it has been said that middle age is a dangerous age. Indeed it can be so when instability and discontentment should have the better of us. The result is either for better or for worse, depending on how we make our new decisions and reset our course of action.

To conclude, middle age is fascinating as well as devastating. It is a juncture where life is made or unmade. It must come to pass for every one. I do not intend to give advice because I am not capable being as human and as frail as anybody else. I said

the above only in the hope of invoking self-inquiry and recapitulation. And as a final word, may I suggest that life is a choice, a choice to be made not only at youth but all the time and at every turn or cross-road of life. Successive choices do have however a continuity and contingency which cannot be cut up into segments, detached, independent and forgotten. Yes it is a chapter and a chapter in a complete book of many chapters. I plead for prudence and perception in every decision making, large or small.

Middle age is an artificial designation, the significance of which can only be interpreted and appreciated by each individual on his own. A happy person is he who grows with his years not only physically but both mentally and spiritually. He is a student of life-long learning, a man of word and deed. He may be a rebel yet fundamentally a liberal. Abound with grace and serenity, he lives a perpetual youth in tune with God and men.











The conference lasted two days and was brought to a happy conclusion with the adoption of several resolutions for implementation that such conferences must be held every two years in order to serve as a useful medium for bringing together overseas Chinese

from all over the world to help develop tourism in Taiwan as well as channel traffic to each and every territory where Chinese travel agencies are in business. Of course the idea is excellent but it would be a long way towards achieving ideas into action as so much depends on how the future conferences are to be organized.

Lion President-Elect Yam Kwok Hung went on business-cum-pleasure to Malaysia and Singapore. Lion Yam would have needed recuperation in the Lion City after all the hard work done for the Joint Charity Ball. The man to watch for 1969-70 as the President of the Lions Club of Castle Peak is now back at the helm of state!

香港青少年教育問題

香港私立中英文學校協進會會長葉迅中先生應邀出席五月廿二日太平山獅子會午餐例會，就香港青少年教育一題作專題演講，立論正確精闢，所提建議極饒積極意義特節錄講詞原文如下：

本港青少年，佔全港人口總額半數以上，到一九七一年時，在四百多萬人口當中，年齡在廿五歲以下的青少年，將佔二百三十多萬，而成年人則僅佔一百七十多萬，從上面的統計數字，說明了青少年問題，在今天是應該受到重視的。

自一九六七年五月騷動事件以後，本港有關當局，民間團體以及負責社會工作的組織，都對青少年問題作積極的探討與研究，並紛紛展開各種青少年輔導工作及擴大各項康樂活動，從表面上看來，確是滿載盛哉，但從另一角度細加檢討，則發覺我們對青少年前此所作的努力，顯然仍是不夠的，例如：我們在教育及青年福利方面是否做得充份？對青年就業可曾有起什麼積極性的援助？以及有沒有真正了解到年青一代的實際需要而設法滿足他們。

但非常可惜，答案顯然都是否定的，更使人感慨的是：本港現時許多正在推行中的有關青年計劃及活動，多沒有實際接觸到青年問題的核心，最主要的一點，就是大家都似乎沒有十分了解到今日青少年們的真正希望和需要，因而不能根本解決青少年們的切身有關問題。

要使今日的青少年，能成爲他日香港社會的棟樑，必先要他們有機會接受良好的教育，與及在生活上獲得充份的照顧，否則決不能培養出年青一代的優良素質與才能，以承擔起未來社會接班人的責任，因此，整個社會必須儘量在這種人類資本上投資——對年青一代的投資，當然，那並不是完全沒有原則的，首先就必須要有一個明確的目標，比方教育及青年福利問題，便是其中最重要的一環。

說到青年教育問題，原則上首先應該了解到今日的香港青少年，需要的是何者一種教育，否則便會犯了本末倒置，以及盲目投資之弊，以本人淺見，教育的主要目的不外是訓練學生明理（懂得做人之道）及致用（具備謀生技能），但很可惜，我們却發覺以上這兩個求學的目的，在香港的教育中都同樣沒有達到。

德育問題，在本港各種教育問題中，一向是最嚴重的一環，這是衆所周知的，以前文法教育，已有人認爲德育不足，現時工業教育漸漸抬頭，教育的現實觀念，愈來愈爲人所服膺，德育之被漠視，可說也愈來愈顯著，這是不待智者而後知之，也許有人以爲這是一個抽象的問題，而事實上却是一個最現實的社會問題。試想：假使每一個人都有一門或一門以上的工業技能，但他們不明白對人應如何，對事應如何，他們對社會，對人羣沒有正義感，沒有責任感，分不出何者爲是，何者爲非，請問這社會將會變成一個怎樣的社會？所以如果徒然高喊提倡工業教育，注重技能訓練，決不是解決教育問題以及社會問題的根本方法，最少亦應在德育方面有所調和及折衝之，否則，其教育效果及對將來社會可能發生的不良影響是值得憂慮的。

至於工業教育方面，可說是本港近年來最受注意的，由於文法中學的出路在今天已日見蹙迫，於是人們放眼於工職業教育，認爲小學畢業後，應讓兒童進入工業中學就讀，使將來有一技之長謀生，所以這幾年來工業中學的發展相當蓬勃，但其中又會有不少輿論，批評當前的工業中學教育，說工業教育成份太重，學生畢業後，仍不能憑所學問世。但工業中學的教育界，却另有意見，他們說中學教育是基本教育，工業中學同樣是中學，不能脫離中學教育應有的範疇，

至失其基本教育的意義。如果把工業教育成份增加太多，這樣，便使工業中學成爲工業技能訓練學校了。本人以爲這兩方面意見的提出，是非常有意思的，也是非常重要的。香港教育之能否圓滿，要點所在便着落在這問題的正確解決辦法之上，這便是：如何使教育有着雙重的生命——明理（做人）與致用（謀生）。本人不是教育家，但相信座上各位亦有同感，這便是教育偏向任何一隅，都不是健全的。而香港當前所需要的，便是如何使教育能兩全其美。陶淵明有一句詩說：「彌縫使其醇」，這「醇」的一字，我認爲實在很值得有志於今日香港教育研究之士所細心體味的。

根據統計的顯示，本港近年來青少年犯罪案件大有增加，以去年全年計算，十六歲以下之青年犯人，增加了百分之三五、五，十六歲至二十歲以上之青年犯人，增加百份率三八、一，但廿一歲以上之犯人，則只增加百份率六、一，照上述之統計，無論青少年或成年犯人，皆有增加，但其中最嚴重者則爲十六歲至二十歲之青少年犯人，他們所犯的案件包括破壞公安、強姦、爆竊以及暴力行劫等等，這真是一個很嚴重的社會問題。

造成青少年犯罪因素相當多，其中教育與現實生活脫節及青年福利沒有獲得妥善照顧，也是主要原因之一，如所週知，本港適齡兒童失學現象仍然普遍存在，中學畢業生在校學非所用，出到社會不容易獲得職位，（因種種原因而未完成中學階段者則遭遇更慘），而專上學生方面，許多在大專學院畢業者，其所讀學位，迄未獲得承認，因而求職發生困難至使許多有志青年深感失望苦悶、徬徨無計，很容易受到外間壞勢力所誘惑，走上罪惡歧途。

爲年青一代着想，香港今日不特需要從教育方面改進，同時更需要在青年福利大量投資，以滿足今日青少年的需要。

要說明今日青少年所需要的福利，實在並不是三言兩語所可能交代得清楚，但我個人認爲本港青少年們所要的福利主要是：（一）學位的獲得（包括中小學、專上學院等），（二）職業的輔導（包括職業登記、介紹、訓練及有關援助等），（三）生活的照顧（包括一切與助學金、貸款基金、正當的康樂活動及設立青少年生活輔導機構等），當然對於青年福利要做的事還有許多，而且認真說來，主要還是要聽聽本港青少年們自己的意見，不然的話，那就難免會掛一漏萬了。

最後，本人願意提出一項建議，藉供社會福利工作當局參攷，這便是實施「青年登記」（這是一個暫定的名稱）。這辦法是由各區民政署對區內凡在小學畢業年齡後一年（即十三歲）的青年，如果仍沒有升學的，進行一項調查及登記。此舉的作用甚多，概舉之有如下各點：

（一）藉以獲悉區內一般居民的經濟狀況，作爲擬訂改善民生計劃及教育計劃的資料。（二）瞭解青年的實際生活，作爲擬訂青年福利計劃時的資料。（三）政府如有意推行青年職業介紹工作時，這當然是一項必要的資料。（四）此外，這項工作在治安上也能起很大的作用。如所週知，香港的青年犯罪事件，日有所聞，事先的除範與事後的偵查，都是繁重的工作，但政府掌握了上述有關青年生活狀況的資料後，相信不獨有助於犯罪案件的偵查，亦可使部份不良青年有所顧忌，而收事先防止的作用。





HONG KONG (HOST)

Guest Speaker at the Luncheon Meeting on 16th May was Mr. Don Walker Australian Trade Commissioner—we reproduce part of his address to the meeting:—

International trade is like life—it is easy to gain a reputation but hard to lose it.

When a customer receives inferior goods from a country with a reputation for quality, he is likely to say that it is an isolated case, and the general reputation remains high. On the other hand, if he orders goods from a country with a dubious reputation, and the quality is not good, he simply says "it was a mistake and I should have known better". Exporters in the Far East realise what a battle it is to change a reputation.

It seems only a few years ago—within my memory, that Australia was in an unusual position—with a reputation as a supplier of primary products and raw materials, and *not* manufactured goods. In other words, when we began to industrialise we had to face a reputation for making virtually nothing.

There were two major influences in Australian industrial development:—

First, migration from Europe in the early 1930s, as a result of political unrest, resulted in a flow of migrants with highly developed skills and the incentive to use them.

Second, the War, from 1939, forced us to realise our isolation and the necessity to become industrially independent as quickly as possible.

Following the War, Australians become conscious that they could do things themselves instead of being dependent upon other countries. This was the beginning of the development of a new trade pattern. Europe was disrupted, and Australia could supply. However, the major demand was still for foodstuffs, primary products and raw materials.

The further development of industries called for intense market exploration. It was found that many of the emerging countries required assistance, with both advice and equipment, and the Australian experience in developing quickly from a primary

producer to an industrialised country was of great value.

The crisis in communications following the Suez closure in 1956 accelerated the realisation that our future lay in the Asian and Pacific areas, and concentration of trade promotion in these areas began in earnest.

At the same time, many European manufacturers realised this and took advantage of the opportunity to set up manufacturing facilities in Australia to supply this new and rapidly growing area.

The inflow of capital in recent years and the discovery of immense resources of minerals has resulted in a dramatic change in Australia. It is now quite highly industrialised with successful production of even the most sophisticated equipment.

Two factors have been very important in this development: firstly, the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation, whose tremendous scientific and technical resources are available to any Australian undertaking to assist in improving products. Examples of this are the improvements in woollen fabrics such as permanent creasing, moth proofing, shrink proofing etc. The other, the setting by various Government Authorities of extremely high standards, in many cases higher than those set by Government Authorities in more developed countries. For instance, the Post Master General Department's standards for telecommunications equipment are reported to be the highest in the world. This can result in higher prices, but we feel that it would be unwise to sacrifice quality for price advantage.

So we come to the present where we can say that Australia can offer almost anything, with confident assurance of quality, modern and original designing and a reputation for rugged reliability. This last feature results from the necessity for all products to stand up to hard

conditions as experienced in Australia, frequently with no servicing facilities within hundreds of miles. In such conditions dependability is the basic consideration.

Onepoint I would mention is that in the course of an investigation into our telecommunications equipment and electronic industries I found that Australia has emerged as a "master of the short run". By this I mean that whereas some major countries are geared to long production runs resulting in low costs, where there is a requirement for a limited quantity these major producers find it too expensive to interrupt their long production runs. On the other hand the Australian manufacturer is geared to them and quite frequently can underquote the manufacturer in the countries with greater production and wider reputation.

I would leave you with this picture: Australia usually can offer, confident of quality and competitive in price. All our manufacturers ask is the opportunity to prove this.




Leo Club Activities Donation To Roof Top Center


A section of the Center showing students singing.


