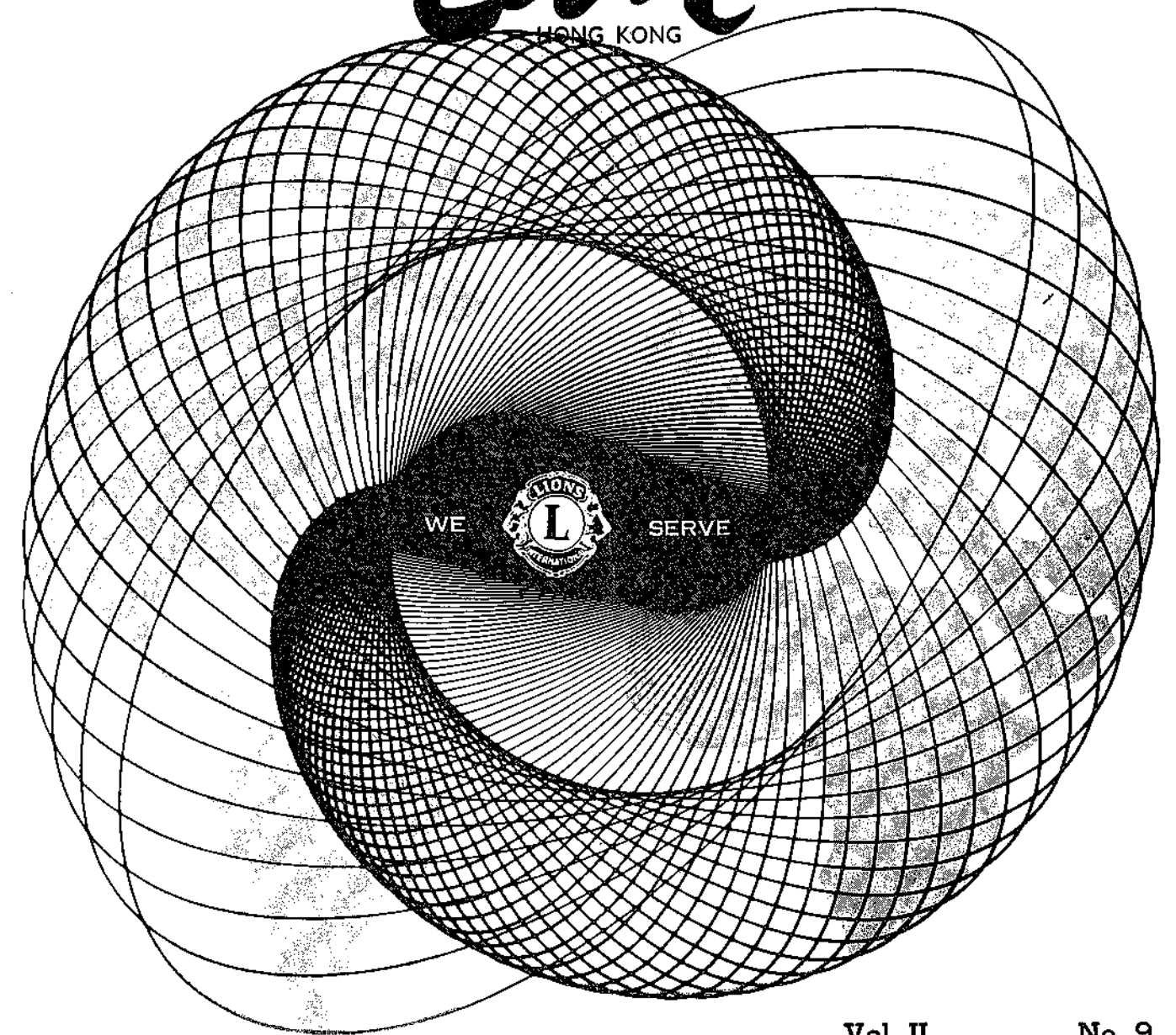

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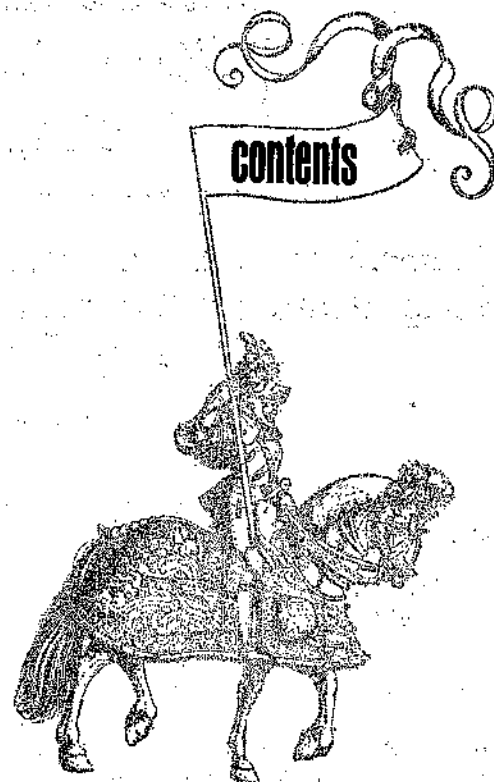

2. Hotel accommodation for many delegates was not ideal, but this was unavoidable in view of the very large number of foreign delegates attending from all over the world, including an equally large number of Japanese delegates.

3. The Convention was one of the largest ever in the history of Lionism, with about 40,000 delegates having registered. There was a highly colorful Lions Parade in the heart of Tokyo, at which the Hong Kong delegation turned out in full force. As the District 303 Hong Kong delegation moved down the parade avenue, we received a continuous round of applause from the thousands of onlookers lining both sides of the parade avenue.

4. There were two opening ceremonies. The one at the Nippon Budokan Hall for overseas Lions was graced by the presence of the Emperor and Empress of Japan. The other opening ceremony for 15,000 Japanese Lions took place in the same building at another hour in the presence of Prince and Princess Hitachi. During the opening ceremony, the Emperor addressed the Convention and urged delegates to work for the realization of Happiness of Mankind.

5. District Governor Lion John Poon attended the District Governor's School at New Otani Hotel.

6. The following Lions were elected to the various top posts at the international level:—

W. R. BRYAN	International President
DR. ROBERT D. McCULLOUGH	First Vice President
ROBERT J. UPLINGER	Second Vice President
GEORGES FRIEDRICHS	Third Vice President

Lion Georges Friedrichs was elected after a heated election campaign with three other contestants from India, Peru and the United States.

As the new International President was announced, tremendous cheering and applause filled the giant hall. Hundreds of Lions then commenced marching around the hall with brass bands and drum-and-pipe groups.

7. The new International President in delivering his address spoke on the theme for his year of office: "UNITE MANKIND THROUGH LIONISM" and also urged more activities for youth.

8. During the Convention, the Japanese Prime Minister, Mr. Eisaku Sato, told visiting Lions from the 107 countries that he believed that to become "the stabilizing force in Asia" was the most urgent role for Japan. He also expressed the belief that Japan should direct the great ability of the people into useful channels for the welfare of mankind, particularly for the peace and stability of Asia. When the Prime Minister ended his speech, International President Lion David A. Evans presented him the Lions' Head of State Medal together with a plaque and a desk pen-set.

9. There were a wide variety of entertainment for the Lions participating at the Convention, including sight-seeing tours and ladies fashion shows. Two evenings were devoted to entertainment featuring Japanese dancing, Korean signing, acrobatic feats and rock 'n' roll music.

10. The Convention ended on Saturday at the Budokan Hall as the assembled delegates joined hands in singing "Auld Lang Syne". The next International Convention in 1970 will be held in Atlantic City.

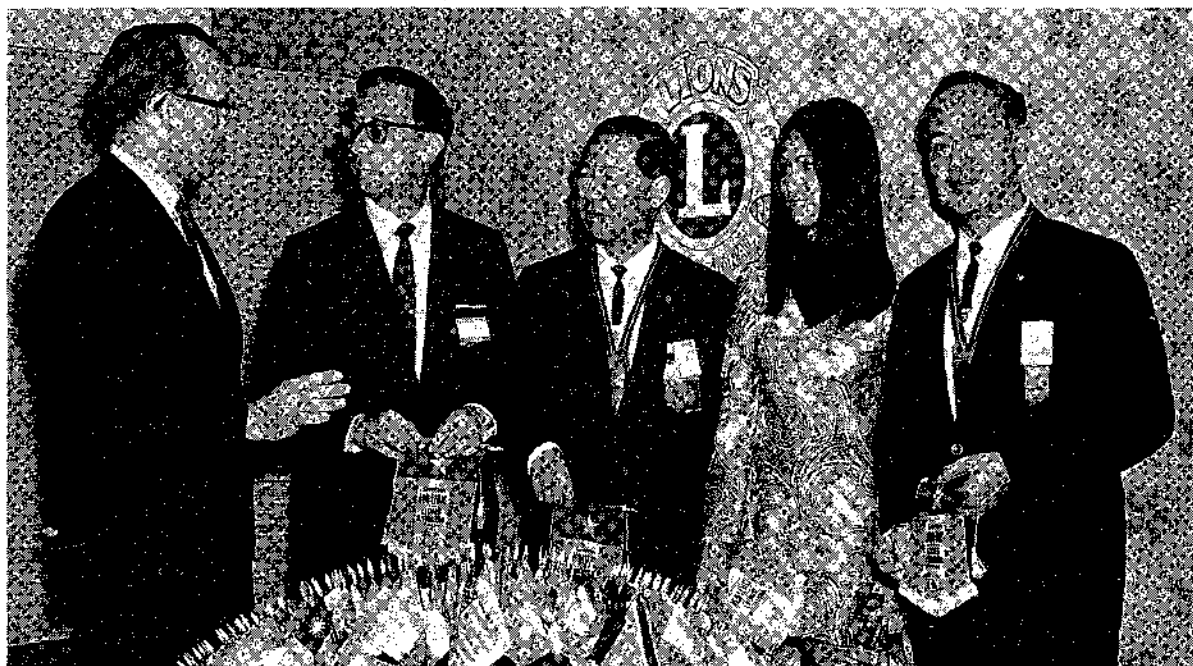
11. After the Convention the Hong Kong delegation divided up into several groups, some returning immediately to Hong Kong, others continuing their tour of Japan, or visiting Korea and Taiwan before returning home.

12. I cannot end this report without expressing the appreciation of District 303 to the Lion Clubs and the many individual Lions in Hong Kong who worked long hours to organize and co-ordinate reception arrangements for the thousands of foreign Lions passing through Hong Kong before and after the Convention. A Reception Booth was set up at Kaitak Airport, and all Clubs in the District welcomed the visiting Lions, who often appeared only a few minutes before the meeting started. The International Convention was an unique opportunity for Lions from the 107 countries represented at Tokyo to visit Hong Kong and to meet with Lions in our District.

I also wish to express appreciation to the several Lions who so ably and generously assisted in the organizing arrangements for District 303's participation at the Convention.

"Unite Mankind Through Lionism"

"Unite Mankind Through Lionism" was the theme of the District Governors-elect School held in Tokyo from June 29 to July 1, 1969, which I attended together with some other 400 District Governors-elect from all Districts. The purpose of this leadership seminar was to assist the District Governors-elect to prepare for their year as the chief administrative officer of their respective Districts. All subjects had been selected to cover the important phases of instruction towards widening the sphere of Lions Information.

The three-day seminar had been arranged to include four interesting areas—inspiration, instruction, participation and general experience. A number of International Officers, past Officers, Directors, past Directors, past District Governors, and International office staff collaborated to cover all these phases.

The Seminar commenced at 1.00 p.m. on the 29th June, 1969, in the Fuyo Grand Banquet Hall of the Hotel New Otani, where all District Governors-elect were accommodated, with lectures on all subjects relating to the duties of a District Governor. At 3.20 p.m. all participants adjourned to separate rooms, 8 in all, to attend discussion groups. All these groups, conducted in different languages for the benefit of the participants, ran parallelly. Questions were asked and answered in the Discussion Group. The first day's session ended at 4.50 p.m.

The Second Day began at 9.00 a.m. with 6 speakers in the morning. The afternoon was spent in Discussion Groups.

The morning of the third and last day continued to be dedicated to discussion in Discussion Groups. After lunch, came the closing session. The incoming International President, W. R. Bryan, spoke on the Movements objectives for 1969-70. The solemn moment came when all District Governors-elect were asked to take the oath of office and were each presented with a certificate.

The four objectives mentioned by the incoming International President W. R. Bryan were:

1. Increase the memberships of Lions International by 50,000 in the current term. The present memberships is 910,000. The target increase represents a little more than 5%.
2. Increase the number of Lions Clubs.
3. Increase the number of Leo Clubs.
4. Retention of members whenever possible.

I have derived much benefit from this Seminar. It revealed to me that there was much to be learned about Lionism represented by that great body known as Lions International. The knowledge I have acquired has given me much inspiration and confidence to undertake the responsibilities of my office. I was assured by Lions International that their co-operation and counsel will always be forthcoming. Likewise I seek yours. My office is one to serve you. I ask not to be served.

It was of course not all work at the Convention. We had occasions to fraternize and it was my privilege and pleasure to meet Lions and District Governors. There were opportunities to open our hearts and to discuss topics and problems of mutual interest.

The memory of this International Convention, its vastness and the cordial atmosphere and goodwill pervading it will not be easily forgotten.

A Page from the Convention Scrapbook

So I went to the 52nd Lions International Convention in Tokyo, July 2-5, 1969. I also brought my wife and daughter. What a mad, mad, mad Convention! Have I learned something valuable? Was I made a prouder and wiser Lion? Have I made some new friends? Was there opportunity for fellowship and intellectual exchange? I can't say. All I know is that I was at the Convention. If you don't believe it, I have a delegate's badge to prove it.

It was a spectacular, colossal and gigantic event with over 50,000 Lions and their families littering every corner of the world's largest city, even spilling sixty miles out to Atami. Any conglomeration of creatures in such numbers would make a sight to remember. The Budokan where the sessions were held was not big enough to seat everyone, though it is the only indoor arena of comparable size in Tokyo. The overflow was seen in clusters of people in all positions in the circular lobby on all floors of the stadium and in the open space surrounding the rotunda. Even tents were erected on the adjoining grounds to give shelter and rest to the tired and weary, to those either unable or not wanting to participate on the floor. Everybody was free and easy for himself. Too many were interested in souvenir hunting and bargaining. One's only identification was to be around and to be able to congregate and roar like a Lion. Even a badge was superfluous in view of the heavily laden hardware and paraphernalia.

The registration on the first day was a riot. And I must record for history the tears and laughter that I have experienced. I took my daughter along. We found no instructions at the door. We just followed the crowd, pushed and being pushed until suddenly we were pushed in the right direction. More pushing and we were at the counter. Almost 10 minutes were spent to find "Hong Kong" in the Register. I felt that Hong Kong was not as well known after all. When my badge was finally made out, it had taken the girl 10 minutes to be able to spell my name correctly. Now the problem was how to push my way out. I had to collect my daughter who was lined along the walls with other women and children. It was near panic as more pushed their way in. The air was hot and stifling, conditioned, not by a cool breeze, but by the odor of human flesh and sweat. It was 2 hours and a completely saturated white shirt before I found myself in the clearing. What was more unbearable was to have to carry a smile in front of a tired and exhausted body! It was like a concentration camp, one Lion sputtered. No, it was like a zoo.

There was no registration fee to pay. A hospitality book at US\$15 and a bus ticket at Y1,200 were offered if wanted. The former took care of the sightseeing trips in Tokyo and the latter, daily transportation to and from the Budokan. There was no way to fully utilize them as the schedules were tight and not enough buses were available to deliver the delegates on time. In other words, most Lions had to be on their own. And nobody really cared. I succeeded in attending three half day sessions: the Opening at which the Emperor and Empress graced their presence, the 2nd session addressed by Mr. Sato the Premier and the final Election. The dwindling attendance at the successive meetings was to be expected.

Something was missing at the Election. Many were not happy with the mechanics and the ballot sheet. There was no space between the lines, so to speak, to permit the exercise of individual judgment. It was practical and hardboiled in a "take it or leave it" fashion. The electioneering before the fatal day was neither becoming to the Lions. I was herded through a human corridor and emerged with gummed decals all over my body. The names of most of the candidates I never knew.

What could a little delegation do, like ours, in the ranks of giant-size and overpowering groups all geared to impress their fellow Lions in this greatest of all Lions show business? Even our convention pins, specially made for the occasion and the pride of Hongkong craftsmanship, paled in the presence of the more expensive and artistic counterparts. A little American girl exchanged a pin with me. Her father was heard to say that she was cheated by mine of inferior quality. I did not bother to argue. But I can see why the frenzy of pin pinching. One American Lion won the coveted award of being the most decorative Lion. But I must say that we did very well in the Parade. All in all it was an experience, good, bad or indifferent. It was expensive fun at that. I came away with the only satisfaction that I was once at the Lions world convention but hardly with the exalted feelings of the pilgrims of Jerusalem or Mecca.

本會出席各獅兄，除由新廣總監潘約翰獅兄指引參與各項聚會之外，更聯同應約於五日晚參加姊妹會數寄屋獅子會假座東急文化會館舉行之盛大歡宴。是夕台北華僑獅子會，菲律賓拉思披那士獅子會之獅兄，亦應邀參加，為我會及彼之會今春在台北市四會聯結締盟後之首次聚會，意深而情重，加以主人家之隆情厚意，招待殷殷，且珍饈百味，節目豐盈，使赴會獅兄獅嫂無不盡情享受。席間由四會首長分別致詞，及互贈禮物，並邀各會獅兄分唱各地名歌，使會中氣氛非常之融洽與歡暢，直至深夜始盡歡而散。

國際獅子會世界代表大會於七月二日在日本東京舉行會議。青山獅子會出席代表有前任會長吳晉藩，現任第二副會長何義貴，第三副會長陳錦青，理事呂浩、趙汝熙、馮彥等，此外，尚有何義貴獅嫂，陳錦青獅嫂及女公子陳兆玲、兆嫦等一行十人。於七月一日會同三〇三區各友會獅兄飛赴東京，抵達羽田機場之時受到當地獅兄們的熱烈歡迎。

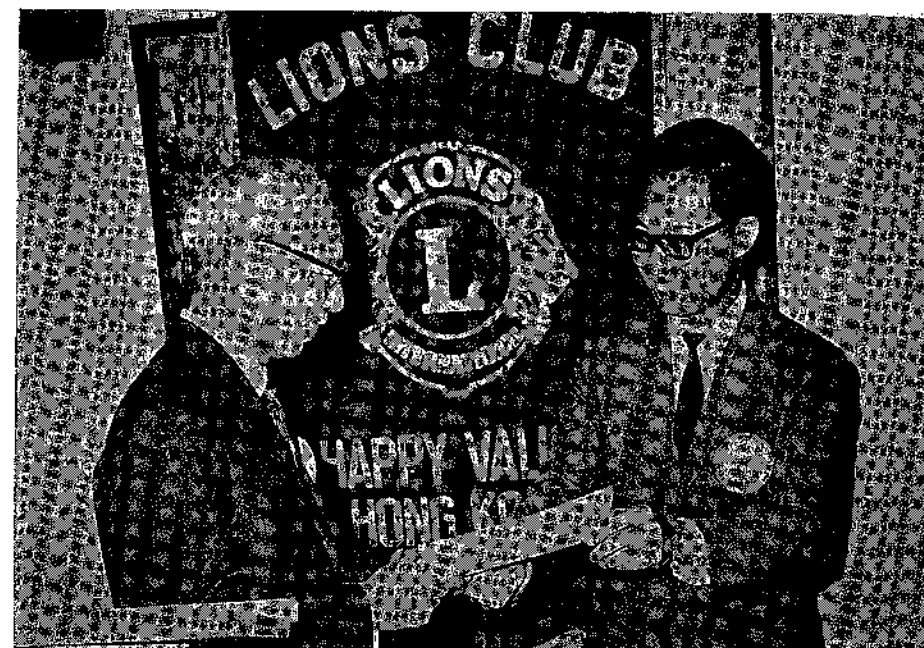

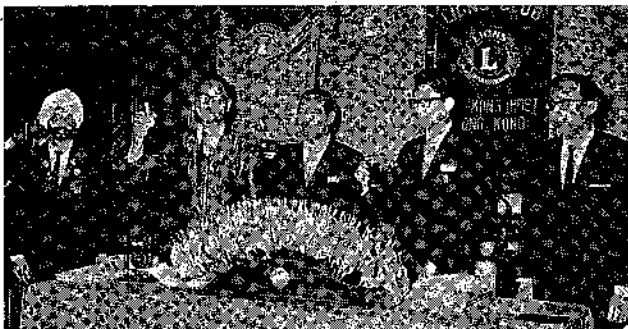

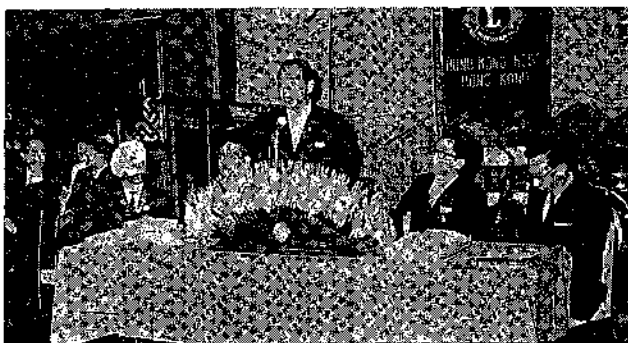

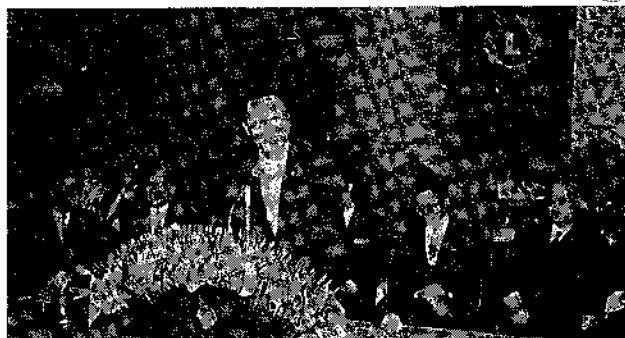

Leo Club Activities

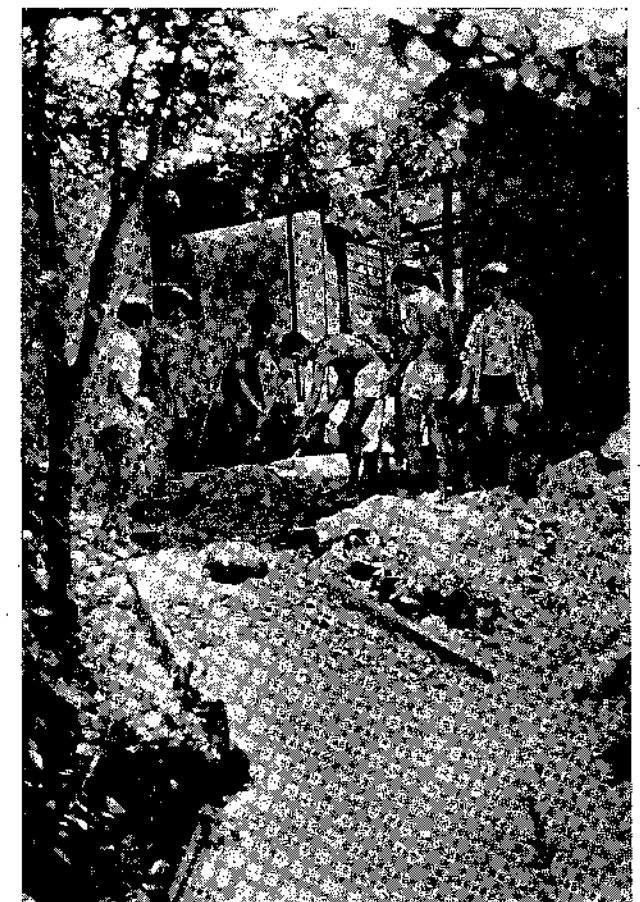
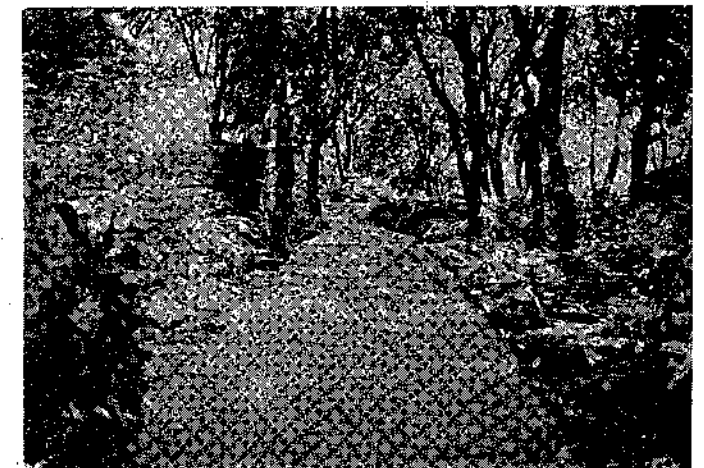
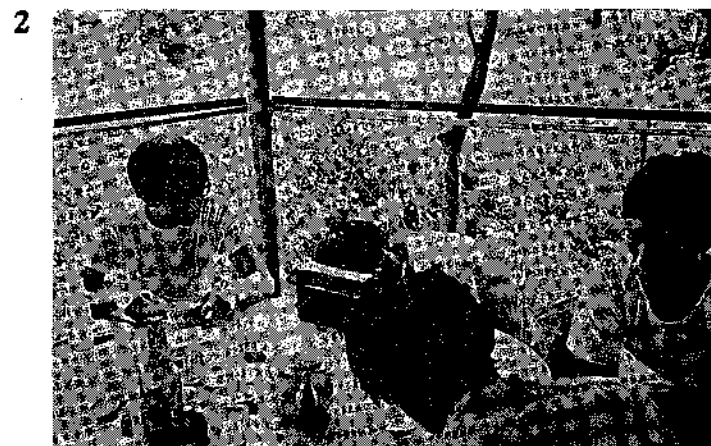

Waxwork Museum for Hong Kong

Lions who have been following the news in the English newspapers might have read in the South China Morning Post issue of 26th April 1969 of a Miss Vivian Sun who is re-creating, in wax, figures of Imperial Court dignitaries in China's history as well as of contemporary people one sees in Hong Kong.

Miss Sun is a Lioness and is the wife of Lion Nelson Leo who is a Past District Governor and who was also a member of the Host Club until July 1959. He resigned from the Host Club to assist in the chartering of the Lions Club of Kowloon under Host Club sponsorship. He became the Charter President of the Kowloon Club. Lioness Leo uses her maiden name in matters of art.

I was privileged to be invited to visit Miss Sun's studio and waxwork factory in Kwun Tong. I had never before seen much of wax figures, other than in the movies, so I was, therefore, very unsure of my reaction at seeing at close quarters life-size figures in wax. My impression of the visit can, I feel, be best described in the following extracts from the S.C.M. Post article—

"For Miss Sun is creating a new

art form which carries on where another woman—Madame Tussaud—left off. She has succeeded in producing, with the aid of a number of several young male assistants without any art training, wax figures which not only look truer to life than those in Madame Tussaud's but will also have "life": they will be given a means to move—to stand up, sit, turn, lift an arm.

"By testing various waxes—from West Germany, Japan and other countries—she developed a wax to produce hands, feet, limbs, heads which, to the touch, felt like flesh.

"Striving for the utmost reality, she worked on features to give the exact pigment of skin, the lines—veins which stand out on the back of an old woman's hand, the finger whorls indented with dirt.

"The hair got close attention. It is human hair on every figure, including the hairs on the chest of an executioner.

"Again the results are evident.

"The reality is almost unbelievable."

I can personally vouch for the absolute reality to life of her wax

figures. For instance, when I stood facing the figure of the man pulling the rickshaw, I had the uneasy feeling that I was obstructing his passage and expected him at any time to give voice to a warning.

Miss Sun tells me that she started working in wax as a hobby some eight months ago with 4 paid helpers who knew nothing whatsoever of sculpture. Today she has 20 employees, some of whom are so dedicated to this art, while still not knowing much of it, that they voluntarily work long hours. For herself, the work has ceased to be a hobby but is now a driving force that keeps her at least 10 to 12 hours daily at it.

She hopes with the support of Government and Hong Kong Tourist Association to give Hong Kong a waxwork museum with some 70 to 100 figures. She reckons that it would take her about 18 months to complete these figures. Very recently, interested parties in Japan have commissioned her to do a large number of wax figures for a museum.

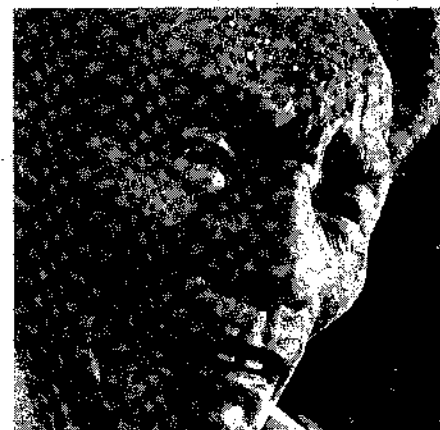

Club Activities

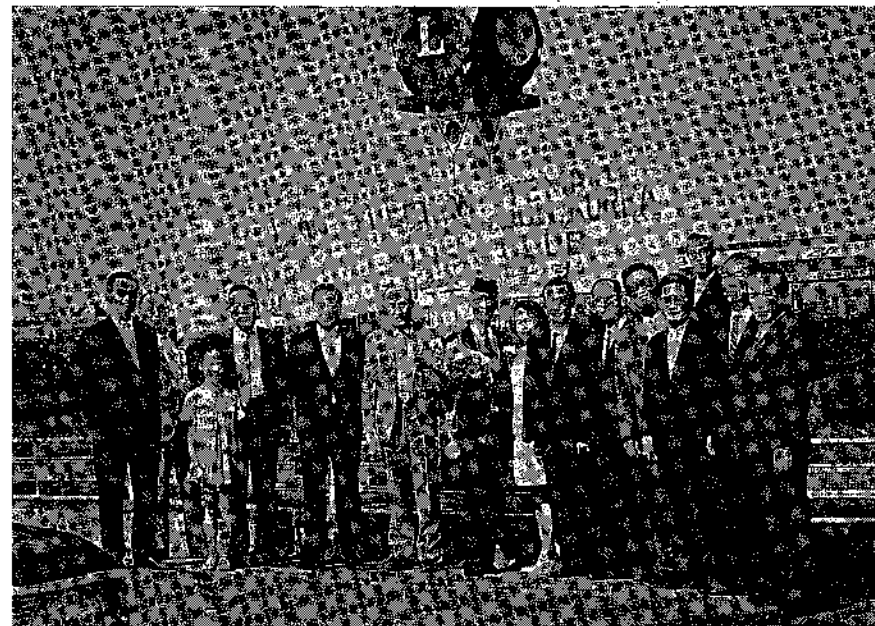

Activities Report

Installation of Club Officers

On 26th June this year, the Club's officers and directors for the year 1969-70 were sworn in a solemn ceremony. District Governor John Poon officiated. Mr. Hilton Cheong-Leen, immediate past District Governor, and a galaxy of Presidents from many Lions Clubs in Hong Kong were present as guests of honour. So were many Lions from overseas. Some of them were invited, others simply dropped in. It was an occasion of lively comradeship and solemn rites. Mr. Samuel Gee Yen, in the last speech he delivered as Club President, thanked the members for their confidence and the outgoing officers and directors for their support. He then presented the gathering with a report on the Club's activities during the year of his office, a year, one must fairly say, of no modest achievements. After praising the incoming President Donald Chu Ta-liang for his talents of leadership, Lion Yen handed his successor the gavel of authority. Thus was closed a glorious chapter in the Club's annals, and began yet a new one.

The new President matched his predecessor in brilliancy, humour and forthrightness in his inaugural speech. He first announced the appointments of the new Club committee chairmen who were to serve with him. He then outlined the main objects of the Club in the year that lay ahead. These were:

- (1) Stronger solaridarity among the members through frequent and colourful group contacts;
- (2) Enlargement of membership: quality above number;
- (3) More interesting Club meetings to ensure rising attendance;
- (4) Streamlined service to the community;
- (5) Continued development of the Club's Youth Music Centre;
- (6) Celebration of the Club's 10th anniversary this year on a somewhat sumptuous scale.

The warm applause from the audience signified a full endorsement of President Chu's policy.

Many overseas Lions spoke on the occasion. One Lion from South Africa roared out his greetings at the end of his speech, perhaps better too early than never: "Kung Hei Fat Choy!"

5 Young Guests from Poleungkuk

The Peninsula Lions had five rather unusual guests in their usual meeting on 11th July this year. They were five children from *Poleungkuk*, the reputable charity organization which looks after hundreds of helpless young girls and children in Hongkong. The Peninsula Lions Club had, in response to the *Kuk's* appeal for donations for the upkeep of the children under its care, offered to be responsible for the expenses of the five. In this meeting, the five met their "uncles" for the first time. They were at once engaged in lively conversation with the Lions and, judging from the ice-cream spattered all over the faces of the three boys, they seemed to be thoroughly enjoying themselves.

Mr. Tung Liang, Chairman of the *Kuk*, took the children to the meeting at the Peninsula Hotel. He was the guest speaker of the evening. Addressing the Lions, he pointed out the objects of the *Kuk's* activities as in complete agreement with Lionism. He emphasized the importance of giving the children in the *Kuk* not only financial support and material comfort, but also love and affection. In appealing to the community for help, therefore, the *Kuk* had decided to place the relation between the helped and the helper on a personal basis: each sponsor (so is he called) to pay for the maintenance of a particular child or a number of particular children. The response had proved to be very warm, and over two hundreds of the *Kuk's* children had known their sponsors. But it was the Peninsula Lions Club, so Chairman Tung said, that was the first civic organization to take up such sponsor-

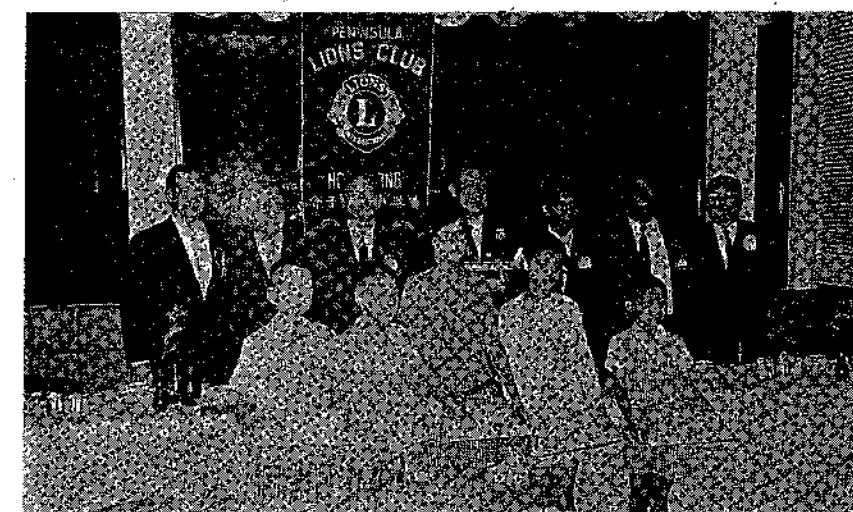
ship. After his speech, Mr. Tung then called upon Helen Wong to go up to the head table to say a few words of thanks on behalf of the five young guests—would you believe it—in English!

Helen thanked her "uncles" for their kindness. She told them that now a "teenager" (she was actually twelve though) she had grown up in *Poleungkuk* since she lost her father when she was "very small". She was excited by the idea that she now had so many Lions as her "uncles", "so excited because for so many years I have been dreaming for the love I have lost." She then continued:

like me. They need more love and affection. Please do help us by supporting the *Kuk's* sponsorship scheme. When become a sponsor, you may visit us on specified times and, if you like, take us out for lunch or for a movie...."

Many Lions answered Helen's call by "dating" her and her friends straightaway. Others offered, in their individual capacity, to sponsor some other *Kuk* children. Towards the end of the meeting, each of the children was given a present to remember their "uncles" with.

Never had a meeting in the Club been so dominated by the love for children. Chairman Tung Liang, himself a Lion, as if determined not to be outdone, generously donated \$300 to the Club's Youth Music Centre.

Sound of Music at the Younth Music Centre

Thirty children between the age of 8 and 12 sat down in a sun-lit room at the Club's Youth Music Centre one Sunday morning last month to wish one another a happy summer vacation before their weekly music class broke up for a two-month recess. Joining them were President Donald Chu Ta-liang, Second Vice President George Ven-chi Wong and Youth Centre Committee Members S.C. Sun and K. H. Hwang of the Peninsula Lions Club, as well as Professor Sheng-shih Lin, Adviser of the Centre, four of the Centre's music tutors and the parents of some of the thirty children.

The occasion was marked with songs, sweets and chats. Lion K.H. Hwang addressed the children and congratulated them for their good fortune of making such early acquaintance with the Muses. He urged them never to abandon music once they had begun to know it as he said, "it ennobles the soul, refreshes the mind and purifies one of earthly worries." He further explained to them what Lionism is and encouraged them to make service the prime object of their future life. Lion Hwang told the children that he would very much like to hear them sing next time not only in Cantonese, but also in **Kuoyu**, "as **Kuoyu** is the common tongue of

all Chinese." "If you do not speak **Kuoyu**," advised the Lion, "you cannot make friends with Chinese from other provinces than Kwangtung, just as you cannot make friends with people from other countries than China if you do not speak a foreign language." Lion Hwang said that because everyone must and did speak **Kuoyu** in the Peninsula Club, the Club was one for Lions from different provinces of China. "Friendship stops where the language barrier stands," said Lion Hwang.

After his chat, Lion Hwang handed a present on behalf of the Club to each of the children who had never missed a class.

The Youth Music Centre of the Peninsula Lions Club was established in 1968. In February this year, the Centre set up a class for thirty children to take a music course based upon the principles of the German musician-educationist Karl Orff. According to Orff, when taught in the way he suggests, children can be helped not only to sharpen their sense of rhythm, but also, and that is more important, to develop their various faculties and propensities through simple music making.

Between February and July this year, for six months the thirty children

met in the class for two hours every Saturday afternoon, when they learned to play percussion instruments under the tutorship of six tutors, who were students in the Senior Class of the Department of Music of the Tsing Hwa College, Kowloon having been specially trained to do the job. The children also sang in group, to the accompaniment of the instruments or piano, when, simultaneously and in quick succession, they also clapped their hands, struck their knees, thumped the floor with their feet and did all sorts of things which the grown-ups found too confusing to do and definitely too late to learn. At the end of the class, they had tea and biscuits.

The class will be resumed early September this year. A new class will then be set up for another thirty children, who will of course need extra instruments. These have been bought by the Club and are now on their way to Hong Kong from Japan. All expenses of the Centre are paid by the Club, and the Lions are very pleased with the results so far achieved.

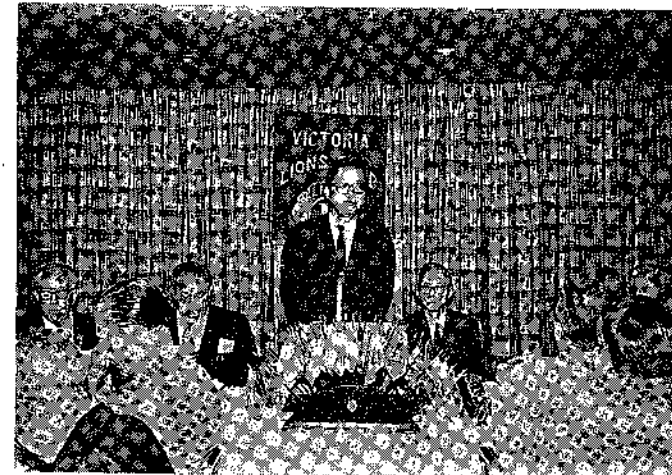
9. Sister Clubs Reunion:

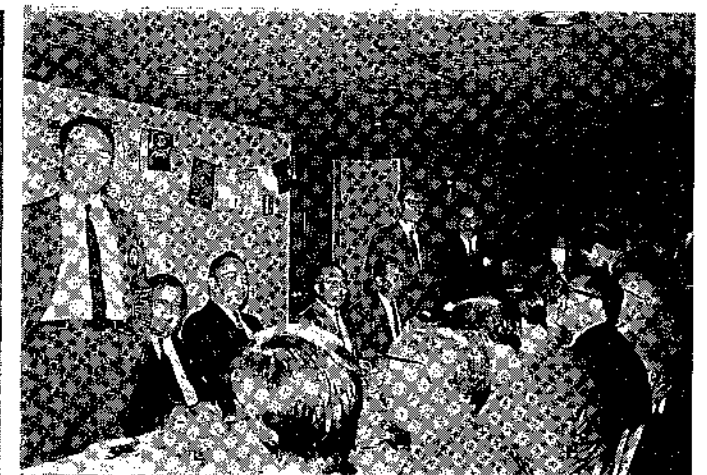
10. Members' Movements:

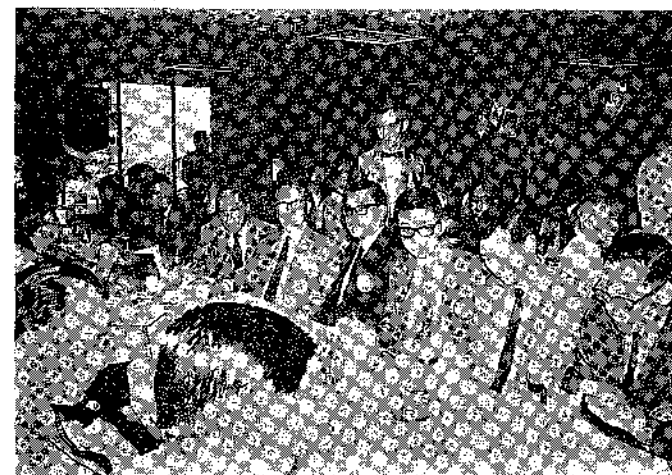

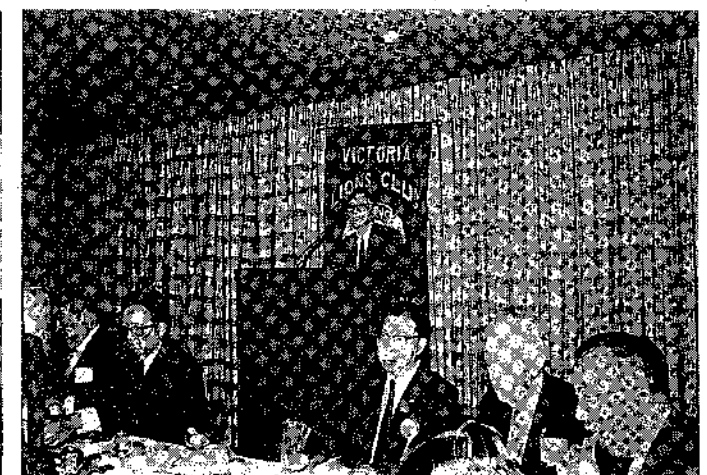
President Raymond presiding at the Regular Luncheon Meeting on 9.7.69 at the commencement of his Office.



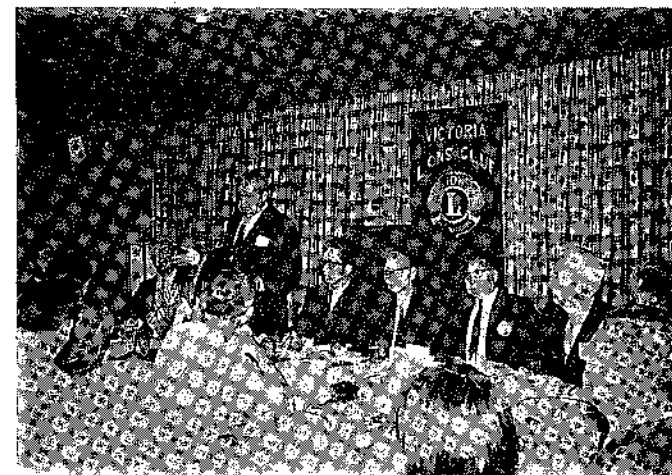

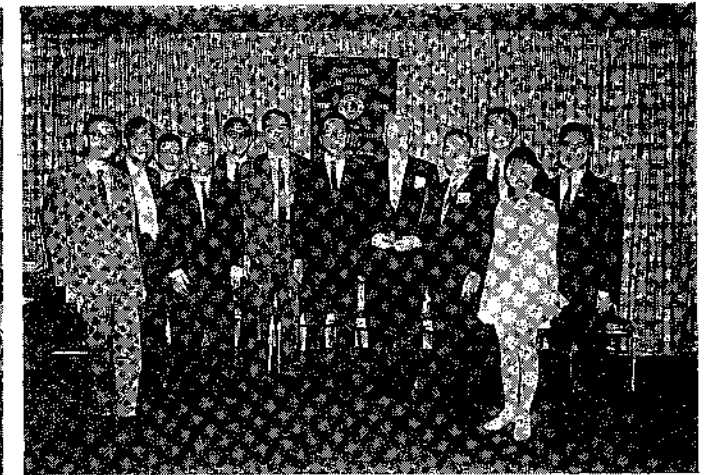

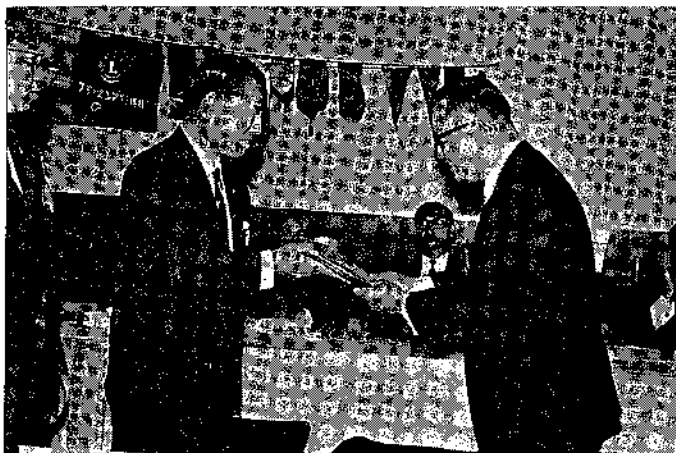

這天，雲集啓德機場，送行的各區會獅兄親友，和其他經港赴日的各國代表們，不下二百餘人堪稱盛況。

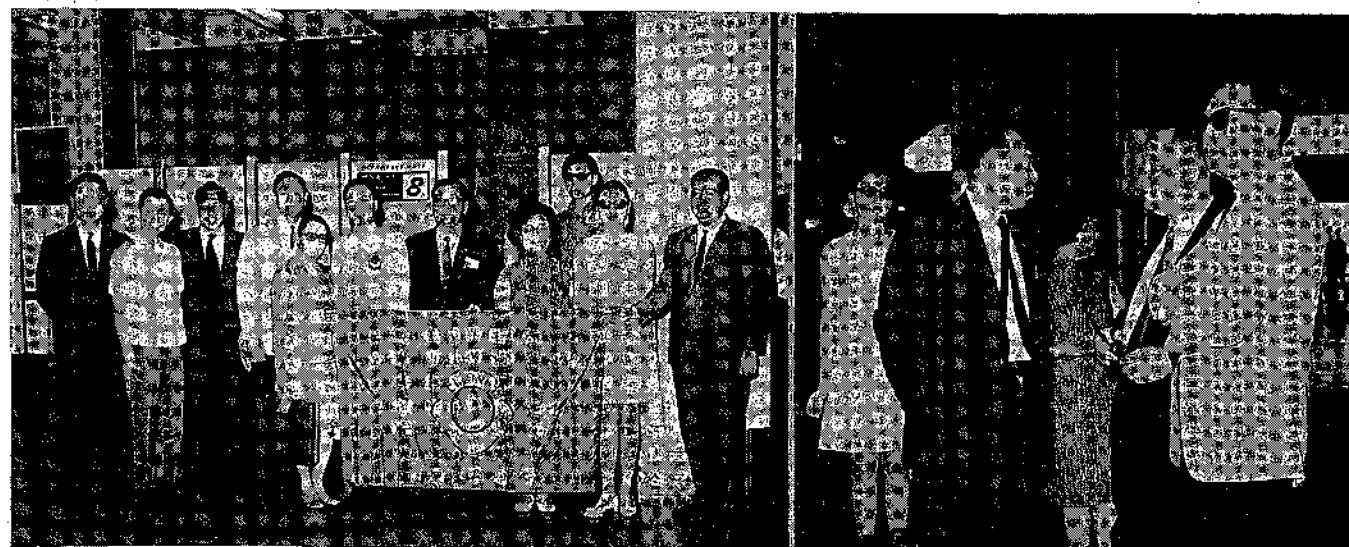
這次在日本東京舉行的全球獅子大會的會場設在東方大酒店，會期一連四天。

「教育出版與教材」 區伯齡主講



區伯齡先生主講
「教育出版與教材」時的神態。

文化事業教育先進區伯齡先生近在本會午餐例會作專題演講，以「教育出版與教材」為題。他指出：

- (一) 教育的重要性——教育不但會影响個人在這高度競爭的社會中的生存條件，而且也在影响到國家的盛衰。
- (二) 「教育膨脹」——甚至知識膨脹——他指出隨世界各地人口的膨脹，跟着出現了所謂教育膨脹，甚至知識膨脹。香港在戰後的教育發展，可說極為神速，比英國本土的發展更快。
- (三) 一個國家的前途，可在國民教的水準上看出來。

他把美國、英國、澳洲等國家的大學和學院的數字與及就讀人數的百分比作一綜合比較。他又說，香港的專上學生，根據一九六八年底統計，共有九千六百二十六人即平均每萬人中有廿四人。若單以二間大學來說，港大有學生二千四百六十六人中有一千九百六十人。那麼，比例就少得可憐。不過是千分之一而已。香港的學生人數雖多，但教育水平比起教育發達的國家，仍差得很遠。

- (四) 教育發展出版工作者可能對教育發展的貢獻——出版人除要以管行政，財政，人事，業務等外，還要有相當的學養，懂得如何審訂和推行出版政策，並審閱稿件。對當地教育政策，學制，課程，考試制度等，更須有相當認識。出版人對一般常識，也要多方涉獵。區氏舉出許多例子，顯示出版人要明瞭自己對社會的責任和對下一代的責任。區氏更提及小學用書，認為應設立一個完備的編輯部，使出版的課本更能盡善盡美。他又指出教育出版與其他出版的許多基本不同的地方，見解精警，議論透闢，異常動聽。

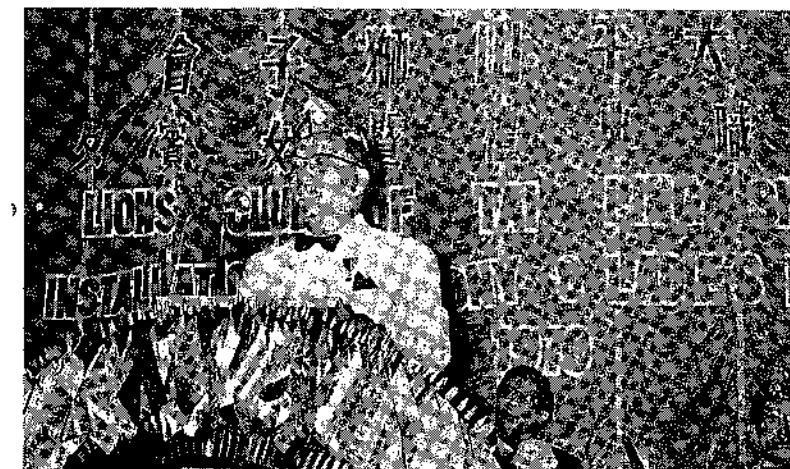

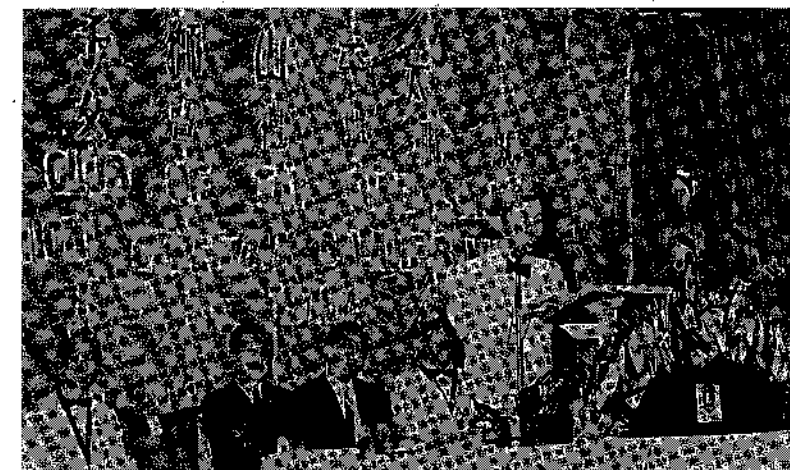

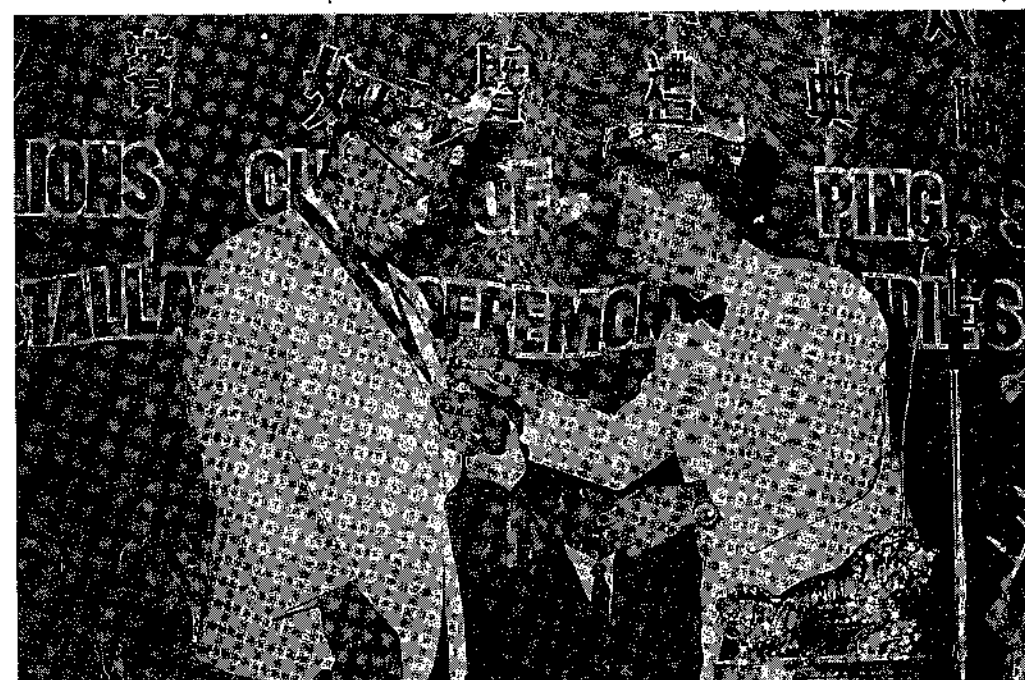

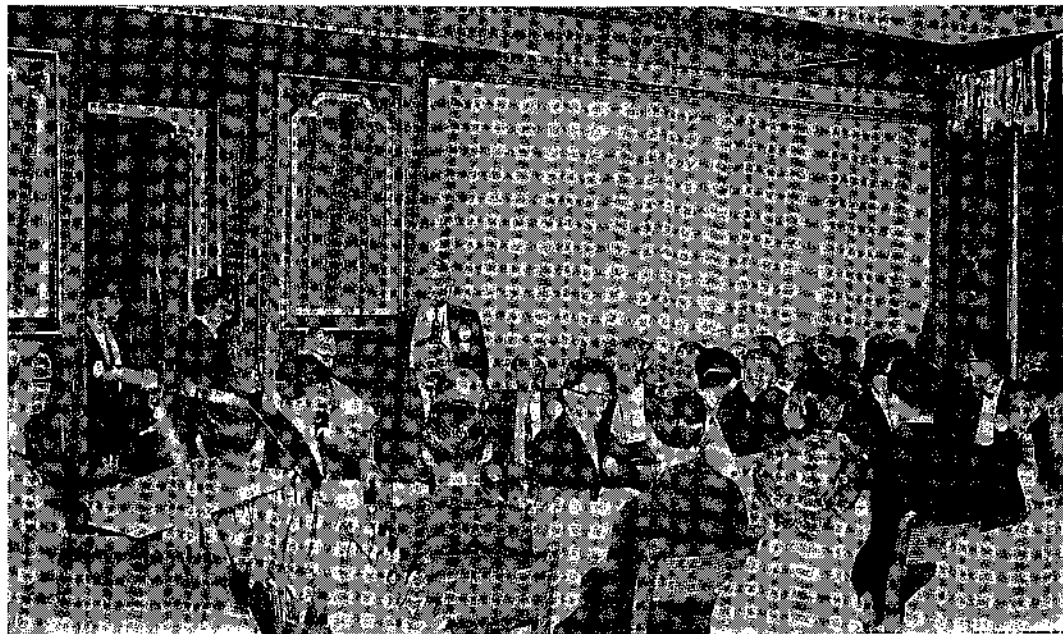
本年度午餐例會

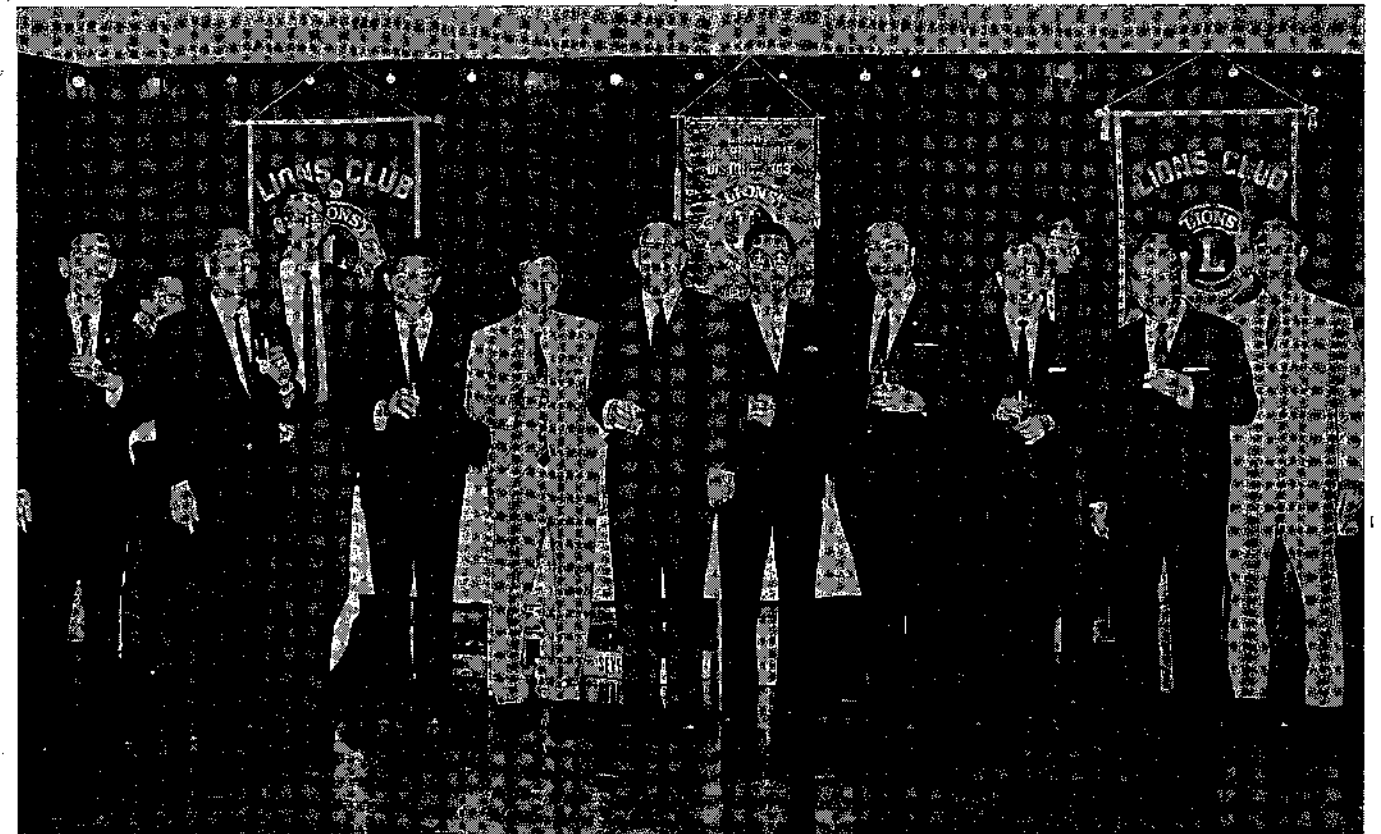


圖為利博士演講時之神態，莊諧並重，材料豐富，聽者咸感興趣。

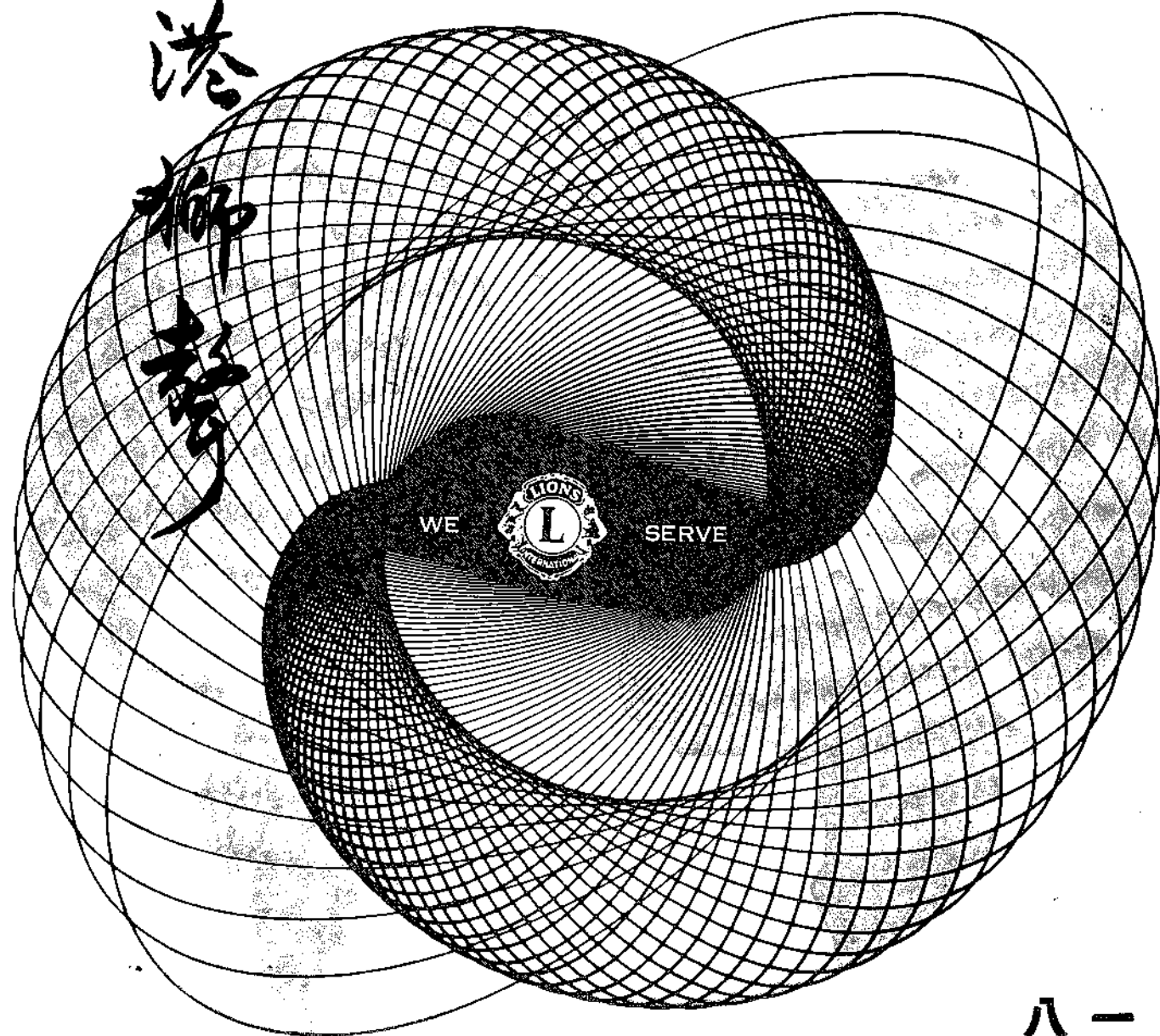
