# News from Lions International

## TOKYO CONVENTION FILM

For the past six months, the Public Relations Division of Lions International has anxiously awaited the arrival of a blessed event—the 52nd Annual Lions International Convention film.

It is called a “blessed event” in light of the numerous problems surrounding the production of this film and the countless hours of extra labor put into it.

But the delay was worth the finished product. Filmed in Tokyo at last year's Convention, the 27-minute, sound and color movie is an excellent documentation of what was Lions largest international gathering in 52 years.

Copies of the film was available as from about January 15. However, there is an extensive waiting list, so that an allowance of at least two months in any request for the film must be made. Clubs are requested to avoid setting a particular date for showing until they are notified that the film is on its way to the clubs or districts.

## OFFICIAL PIN CONTEST

Anyone attending a Lions International Convention is sure to notice the multi-colored vests and hats of the delegates, literally covered with pins from clubs and districts around the world, trophies of the always vigorous and enthusiastic pin trading.

For the past two years, an official pin contest has been conducted during the Convention. This year, the International Board of Directors has decided to establish guidelines for judging the entries and to reward winners with plaques and certificates.

Official rules for the 53rd Annual Convention pin contest were approved at the November Board meeting. Before ordering your Atlantic City Convention trading pin, be familiar with these rules so your pin will be eligible for the competition. Complete information for the production of pins is available directly from the Club Supplies Division.

## RADIO SPOT ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Public Relations Division has initiated a series of radio public service spot announcements

which have been sent to the leading radio station in each of 100 major markets throughout the United States.

The first of the series, sent just prior to the Christmas season, stressed the importance of good eye care and mentioned that “this sight safety message has been brought to you by your local Lions Club.”

Following messages will deal with other areas of Lions services. Listen for them in your district.

With the broadcast industry playing an increasingly important role in our society, these stations are obligated to devote a percentage of their air time to public service announcements. There are many occasions when Lions can take advantage of this, such as informing the community of glaucoma screening in your area; asking for donors in a local Lions blood bank appeal; or notifying the public of a fund raising drive for a local charity.

It is not necessary to send an actual tape or record. A script of your message is sufficient and, in most cases, will be appreciated by the station.

## THINKING THROUGH YOUR PR PROGRAM

Good public relations is not a “hit and miss” tasks. It requires a concentrated effort to think through your goals, abilities and programs.

The following outline, adapted from “Tips & Tactics”, PR REPORTER, October 20, 1969, will help you measure up your PR efforts

1. Have you prepared your 1970 public relations program based upon expected club moves and in the light of today's changed environment and re-defined goals?
  - a. Do your officers understand how the PR program is structured to help attain club objectives?
  - b. Is there genuine understanding among the officers and membership concerning the public relations function?
  - c. Does each member understand and accept his responsibility in helping attain PR goals?

2. Is your PR committee adequate for the job ahead? Is the best use being made of the talents of the members?
3. Have you reviewed your club's standing within the community? How does it compare with other service clubs in the area?
4. Has there been a recent review of internal communications to assure a clear, two-way flow of information both vertically and horizontally?

## DEMAND FOR LOCAL NEWS INCREASING

“As metropolitan areas grow larger the demand for local and community news increases rather than decreases, according to Frank Batten, publisher of the *Norfolk Virginian—Pilot & Ledger Star* and head of a Company which operates 6 newspapers, 2 TV stations, 2 radio stations, and 8 cable TV systems. When people want to know something, he says, ‘more often than not they turn to newspapers’ . . . ‘Newspapers help people relate to their own communities,’ the publisher maintains, ‘by serving as a clearing house of ideas, a forum, a town council, a store of needed information and a market’.”

This should be encouraging news for those PR Chairmen in growing communities who hesitate to send releases for fear of the Lions news being pushed out by other seemingly more important items.

## LEADER DOG FILMS

While Lions are waiting for the new Tokyo convention film to be scheduled for their club or district, they may wish to show two other very good films about the Lions work with the blind.

“She'll Never Walk Alone” was produced by Leader Dogs for the Blind, one of the leading dog guide schools in the United States. It describes the training of the dogs and the blind recipients and gives credit to the numerous Lions Clubs who help support the school. Lions can obtain this film by writing directly to Leader Dogs for the Blind, 1039 Rochester Road, Rochester, Michigan 48013.

Another movie filmed at Leader Dogs was produced by the Social Security Administration. In addition to explaining the work carried out at the school and the assistance of the Lions, the film outlines the Social Security benefits to the blind and disabled, which may be of interest to citizens in your community. ## SERVICE CLUB STATISTICS

## MOON LANDING FILM

In response to the many queries from Lions Clubs throughout the world, Lions International have learned that a film of the Apollo 11 moon landing is available from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The 16mm. sound and color movie documenting the historic flight and man's first steps on the lunar surface is approximately 30 minutes in length and is lent free of charge for viewing by interested groups.

Lions may obtain a copy directly from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration film library in Washington, D. C. or through the United States Information Agency at your local United States Embassy.

If you're not making the most of film potential, take heed of this item from PR REPORTER, August 25, 1969:

“Although most public relations executives have had some experience with business films—either as sponsors or viewers—many facets of motion pictures for PR purposes haven't been fully explored by industry. Organizations which have used films successfully can testify that they're both effective and powerful . . . a communications medium with tremendous impact and remembrance value . . . a proven method of reaching millions of people . . .”

# Lions International Official Pin Contest Rules

## I. Eligibility:

- A. All Clubs, Districts, and Multiple Districts of Lions International are eligible to enter their Convention trading pins in the contest.
- B. All pins are to be made for the explicit purpose of trading and not for resale. Any evidence which indicates that pins are being sold will automatically disqualify them from competition.
- C. Pin entries which have not been purchased through, or through suppliers authorized by, the Club Supplies Division of Lions International shall not be eligible for the contest. Complete information for production of pins is available directly from the Club Supplies Division.

## II. Pin Delivery:

- A. Each Club, District and Multiple District is responsible for delivering their entries to the Public Relations Office, Room 9 in the Atlantic City Convention Hall, on or before Tuesday, June 30, 1970. No entries will be accepted after 8:00 p.m. on that date.
- B. All entries must be attached to an official Pin Contest Entry Blank available at the Public Relations Office on June 30. No

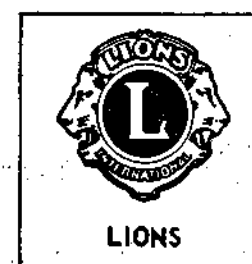
entry will be accepted unless properly submitted and attached to the official entry form.

- C. All pin entries become the absolute property of Lions International upon submission and will not be returned.

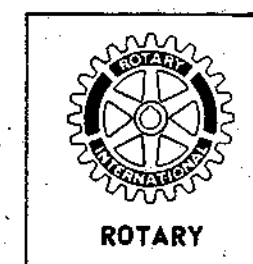
## III. Contest Judging:

- A. Pins shall be judged by a Pin Contest Committee, consisting of the Public Relations Committee of the International Board of Directors, on the basis of attractiveness and originality of design. All entries *MUST* display the Lions emblem as part of the design. All decisions of the Pin Contest Committee shall be final and binding on all parties.
- B. There will be one winner and one honorable mention in each of the three categories: Best Club Pin, Best District Pin, and Best Multiple District Pin. Winners will be awarded an attractive plaque. Honorable mentions will receive a corresponding certificate.
- C. The winning entries shall be announced by the International President at the final Convention Session, Saturday, July 4, 1970.

### 三〇三區消息

#### 香港眼庫近況

##### (一) 主席在一九六九年會員大會中的報告(摘要):

香港眼庫之工作，固係慈善性質但其順利推行有賴於社會熱心人士經費上之支持，及眼庫本身繼續不斷的教育性宣傳。眼庫同人深幸於過去七年間，在各界之鼓勵下，尚能籌畫棉薄。值此年會，應向政府及各界領袖，新聞與廣播界各執事表示感激種種之提携與贊助。

但眼庫工作，尚有待發揚光大。瞻望前途，亦有不少困難。茲擇要略述之：(一)眼庫以往由香港各獅子會及眼科協會全力支持；但今後該兩團體，能否予以同樣或加強的扶植，確係一個主要因素。再以本庫重要職員，是否能一貫地繼續服務，任勞任怨或應給以一端息時期，繼往開來，我們應注意新人才新領袖的開發，庶可將眼庫在管理與技術上均能立於不敗之地。(二)香港眼庫的經費，亦應有妥善的安排。過去七年來，本庫所用款項，總額達港幣十二萬五千元。經費來源，主要由獅子會及少數社會人士捐助。在未來的七年中，經費預算，將必更為龐大，一部份熱心人士，曾提出邀請香港政府當局出面參加提倡眼庫工作。此意在本庫同人，是向為歡迎而求之不得的。

眼庫前途：有賴工作全人認明使命，以改善服務水準及推進工作效率。其應舉辦業務尚多：如青光眼預防計劃，學童之護目計劃，及其他一般為盲人服務之計劃。惟處處需要人才與經費。眼庫在有限度的人事及經費配備下，確不能一一兼顧，祇得擇其有急要性者先為着手。香港人口以幼年人佔大多數，我們深盼能多為香港幼年人造福。因此眼疾之預防，較醫療更應重視。

在結束此報告前，本人謹代表香港眼庫一再向本庫各會員，各董事，暨事及職員，表示深切的謝忱。在本屆年會選舉案內，本人尤希望各位能推舉賢能，並隨時介紹新會員參加服務。眼庫是大家，是香港慈善社團之一，光明之將來多賴社會人士的關心與指導。

##### (二) 會員：現在眼庫共有會員五十四位名錄見英文報告。

##### (三) 鮮眼運港：五對鮮眼球先後由錫蘭空運抵港計，五月十七日兩對，十月廿五日兩對及十一月十五日一對。眼角膜移植手術亦隨即施行！

##### (四) 眼角膜移植手術：本期內進行之移植手術共有四宗如左：

##### (五) 醫藥補助計劃：醫藥補助計劃的宗旨有其特殊性的，乃在拯救盲人，它並不是一間眼科診所，亦不是為普通的眼疾而設的。盲病者多數是被以為無可復原而被送到庫來。在萬一的希望中眼庫同人願出而作最後之努力。這種補助計劃亦適用於角膜移植的病者。

醫藥補助計劃現由九龍與台北市區兩獅子會聯合支持，並由眼庫及眼科醫學會負責辦理，平均每位病者所得的補助金為港幣一百元，住院及眼科醫生們的手術是免費的。在過去的兩年中，曾有二十位病者受益，共用款項約港幣二千元，而手術的成功佔百分之九十。

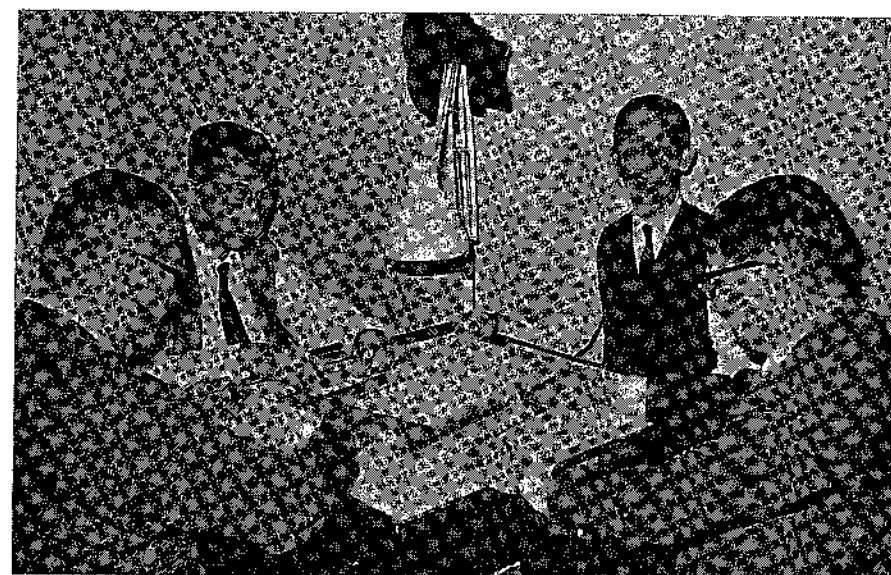
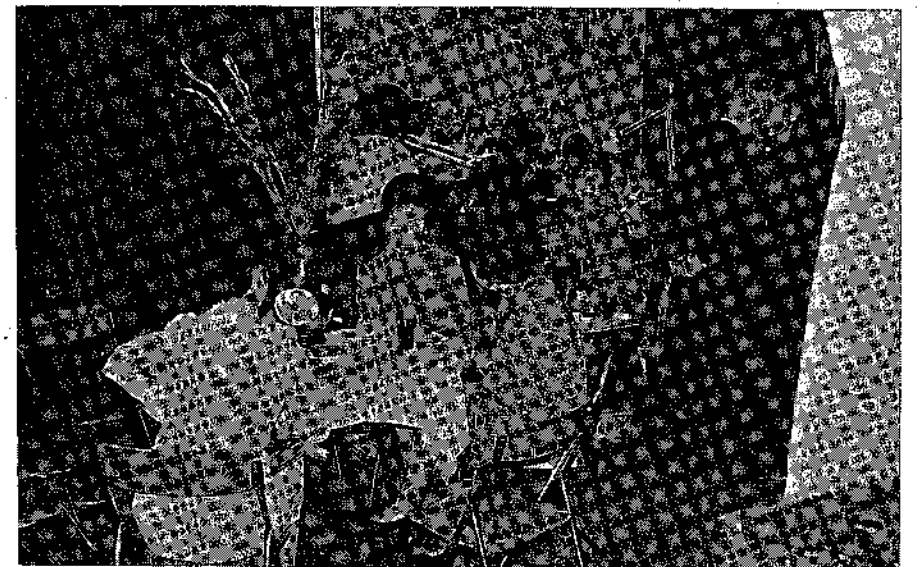


上三圖為獅兄嫂

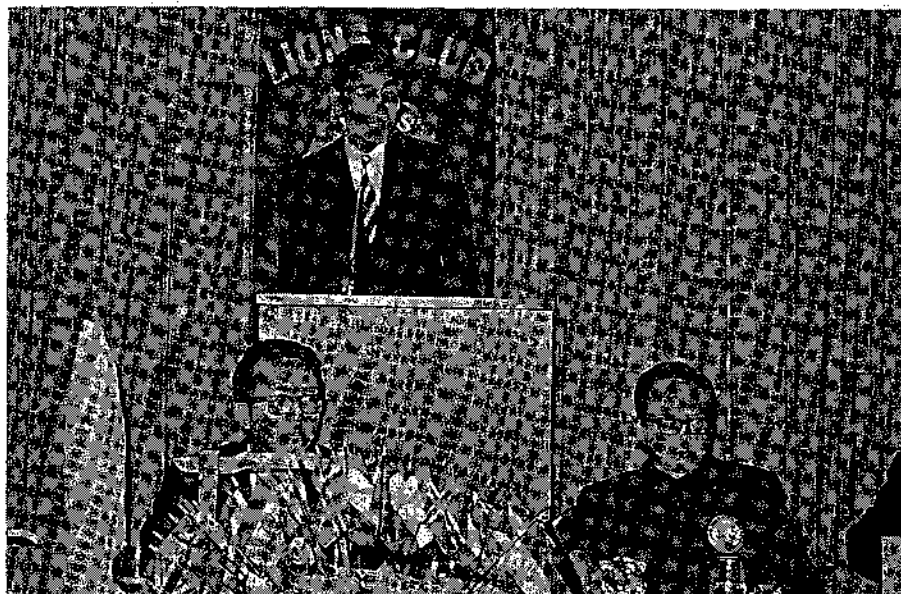
Japan would feel inadequate in his presence.

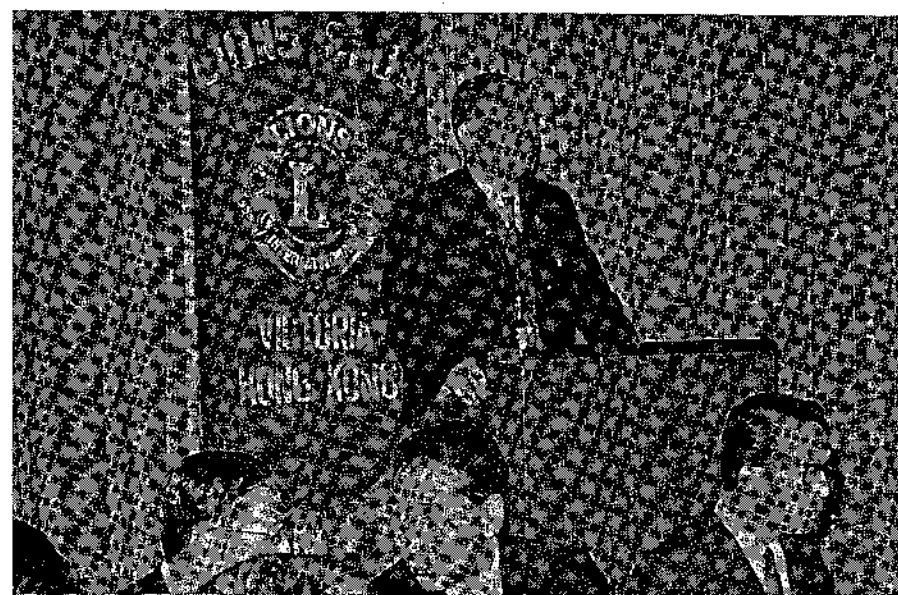
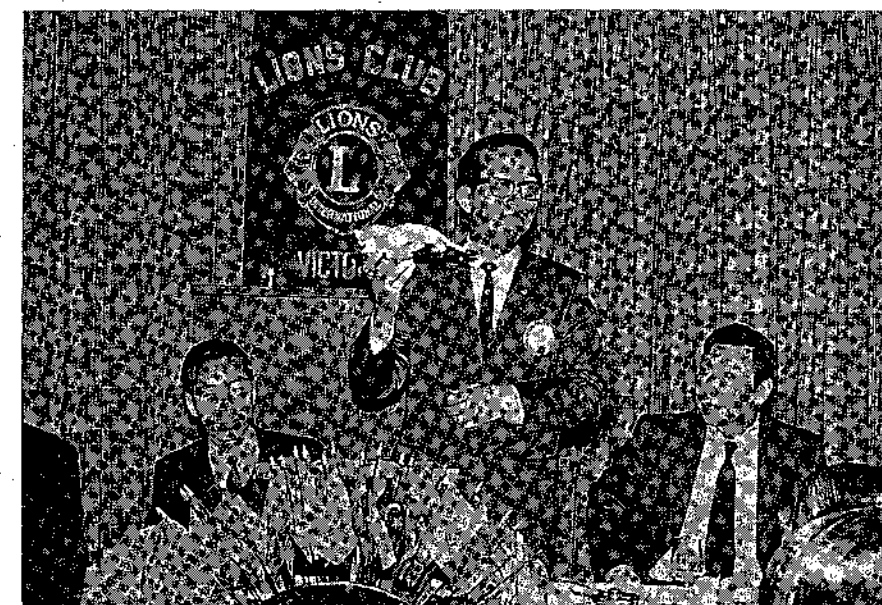

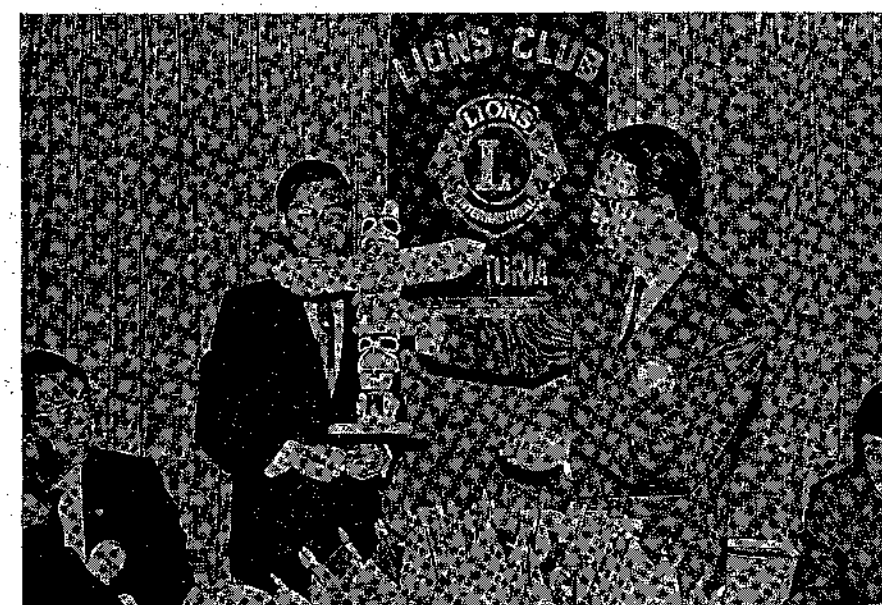

## "Give Youth A Chance to Serve the Public"

A talk by Mr. Stephen Law, Principal Social Welfare Officer, Social Welfare Department.

"Giving youths an opportunity to serve the community is one of the best ways of solving big youth problems", Mr. Stephen Law, Principal Social Welfare Officer, Social Welfare Department, said at the Luncheon Meeting of the Lions Club of Bayview, Hong Kong.

This will make them feel they are needed and important, said Mr. Law.

He added that youths were full of energies which, if properly channelled, could enable them to play a useful

role in the community.

The Government must organise more activities in which youths will have a chance to show their ability, Mr. Law said. These activities are necessary after a hard day at school.

The Social Welfare Department classifies youth activities into three main groups: social work, entertainment and education.

Mr. Law said that there would be social workers in the first two groups

to guide the youths and instructors in the last group to train them to be technicians.

But the most efficient method the Social Welfare Department should adopt is in Mr. Law's view, to send out social workers to organise programmes at all youth centres.

The social workers should also have teahouses where the youth can meet and get to know each other Mr. Law said.

## 本會一月八日例會，由本會副會長何義貴獅兄以冬泳運動為題，作專題演講，其演詞如下：

在今天這個寒冷日子，講冬泳運動未免有太凍的感覺。雖然香港的天氣不算太凍，但是有時候溫度會跌到華氏四十度以下，香港的高山上會凝結成冰，當然海水也會受到氣溫降底影響而至寒涼非常，但是有許多冬泳愛好者浮沉於綠海蒼波之間，享受着新鮮空氣，暖和的陽光和溫柔的海水，世界上的體育家早已一致公認游泳為最有價值的運動，它是澈底的全身運動，非但頭、胸、腹、四肢都要運用，而且牽動內臟，刺激新陳代謝，促進血液循環，使全身得益而能增加身體的抵抗力，所以游泳家患病最少，無論抗熱抗寒都勝於他人，少生病，少患感冒是游泳家的一個最顯著的例證。近十餘年來，游泳已漸成為愛好游泳者的冬季最好健身運動，尤以中年人或上了年紀的人，均一致認為修心養性惟一的日常最好鍛鍊，除了健胃保腎外，更能延年益壽，最近醫學界也承認這說法，事實可以證明游泳可以百疾全消，港九許多冬泳團友中有許多成年宿疾，譬如患神經衰弱，失眠，腸胃病，風濕及哮喘病等症都是在常年游泳而各病消除，前後判若兩人，本人參加游泳已有十一年經驗，曾連獲八年冬泳全勤獎，即是一年三百六十五日，一天不缺，即可得到全勤，近兩年來為了業務上的繁忙已不能得到全勤了，目前港九共有七個冬泳團體，香港有鐘聲，金銀，南華，淺水灣，拯溺，九龍有東方，中青，智健等，總共有團員數千人

以上，團員中有高壽至八十餘歲的也有後生十歲以下的，各行業的人士都有，港九凡是有海灘，泳棚的地方都有冬泳團成立，本人担任東方及中青冬泳團團長數年，初初只有團員數十人以至近來增加到每一冬泳團擁有七八百人之衆，可見冬泳對人類健康的益處。而好此道者日益增多，尤其對於一個優秀的游泳運動員一定要不斷的游泳培養自己的體力及耐力，到夏季比賽時才能有良好的成績，我們現在談談怎樣能游冬泳呢，在欲游冬泳前首先要識游泳，要具備恆心和魄力，從秋涼後繼續不停的鍛鍊下去，這樣雖在嚴寒冬季均能習以為常，未泳前應穿稍厚之衣服，保持體溫及暑作熱身運動但不可過度，以免疲勞，相信每一個冬泳團體都有熱身運動設備，如打乒乓球波羽毛球，拉力機，跳繩等各項運動來輔助冬泳，入水後不能發盡力氣及作快速動作，以免抽筋，應先動作稍緩慢，隨將全身肌肉放鬆慢慢地游直至漸感寒冷及再發力游到全身再覺發暖，隨即回岸，因每人體質不同，抵抗力各異，耐寒力視各人體格而定，苟能習慣如此，約在六個月後，身體會漸轉強壯，更會使你生活上軌道，需要每日早起早睡，減少傷風畏寒，健胃強胃而增加食慾，俗語說「一分精神，一分事業」這種說法是對的，凡屬有益於身心的任何運動，都能增進個人的事業及精神發展，最後請各位多指導及批評，謝謝！

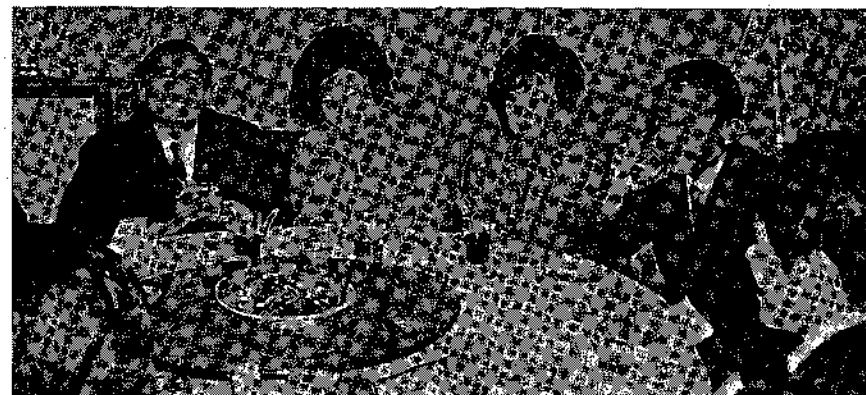

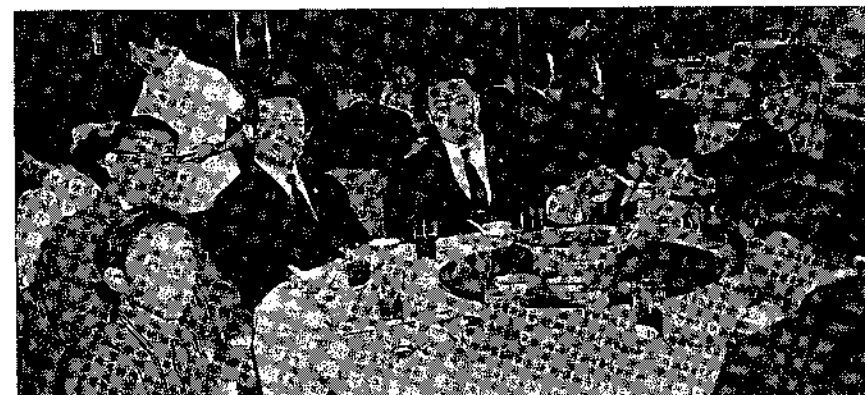

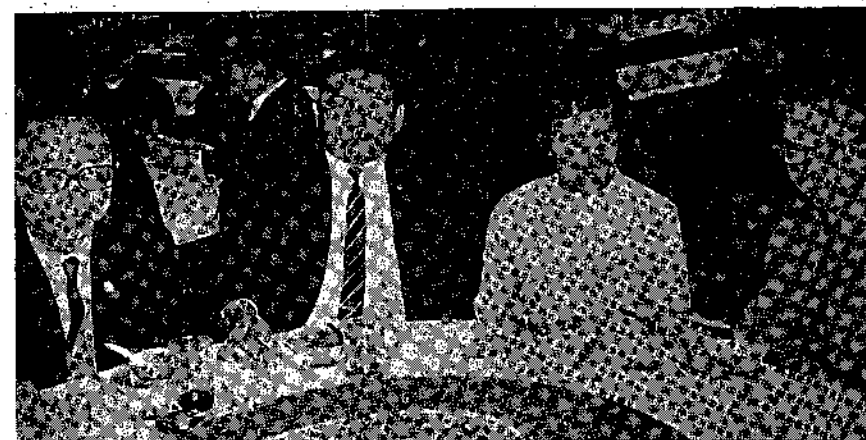
